

> Lose Assessment Reeve John Goy of Acton reviewed his council's concern over Seventh Line of Esquesing to affect approximately 10 pupils. He noted Acton members couldn't understand why the concession should be split.

"We'll lose about 10 pupils right along the Seventh Line at about \$170 per pupil. This could change the future but members of council feel we should have some guarantee regarding the assessment," the Acton Reeve noted.

Members agreed to the second reading noting a change in boundaries would still be possible in the third reading with the Minister's advice.
