# Acton Lacrosse Club Lose Opener Suffer 15-7 Defeat to Brantford

Acton Niels Lacrosse Club went down to defeat in their opening game of the season when Brantford Switsons beat out a 15-7 win in a fast moving game filled with 25 penalties before a crowd of approximately 200 fans in Acton on Tuesday evening.

Acton opened the scoring early in the game when Garbutt took a pass from Tyers to bulge the twine. Tyers received a penalty and while he was serving time, Ross Powless, former Peterborough great, scored the Brantford Indians first tally unassisted, to tie the score.

Powless received a two minute penalty and was dished an additional 10 for sassing the referee. Barry Innes of the Niels joined him shortly with two minutes in the sin bin.

With Acton short, George Grashy, Acton, dodged the defence and shot a hard one into the net to put Acton ahead 2-1. This was followed shortly by another tally by Hillson assisted by Krapek for counter number three.

Grashy went away for a two minute rest and Brantford flicked the light for score number two for Brantford. The visitors scored their eleventh goal to put the game in the bag and as Acton got many needless penalties they scored four more with only six Acton players eligible to play the rest languishing in the sin bin or in the dressing room.

The Acton club showed it was only their last start by being a trifle unorganized especially in the last frame when the Brants pulled away from them. Powless, former senior great and rated one of Canada's best lacrosse players, has a ratty young team in the Switsons and he pulls the strings much like Doug Harvey of the hockey Canadians.
