Township Hires Deacon On Zoning, Land Use Map

Nassagawaga township planning board has hired planning consultant P. Alan Deacon as planning consultant. Board Chairman Archie R. Service said the consultant was called in after the board had drafted its own zoning by-law and the Department of Planning and Development was studying it.

"We just came to the place where we felt we needed some expert advice," he said. Mr. Deacon will also be drawing a proper land use map for the township.

Mr. Service noted some farms are being sold and split into lots. "We've gone to encourage development around the present built-up areas," he said, "and cut down on the ribbon development." A recent plan of subdivision for 14 to 17 homes on a 100-acre parcel was turned down by the board, he noted and the Department had backed up the board's stand.

"Now we won't allow any plans of subdivision until the by-law is finished," he said. Small ones might be "considered" but the board is trying to stop speculation buying.

Came from Iceland Settled in Manitoba

Brought to Canada from Iceland as a child, John Rognvaldson passed away Wednesday, June 3, at the age of 89.

The son of Rognvaldur and Sigrudur Johnson, he was born in Iceland on May 13, 1871. The family emigrated to Canada in 1876. After his marriage at Millwood, Manitoba, in 1900, Mr. and Mrs. Rognvaldson settled at Winnipeg and raised a family of five sons and three daughters. A fourth daughter died in infancy.

Icelandic Tongue
Mr. Rognvaldson was a tall, slight, blacksmith and boatbuilder. There was also Icelandic settlement in the area and the native tongue was passed down to the children. During the long Manitoba winters Mr. Rognvaldson engaged in ice fishing. He avoided an accident by leaving the net line under the lake ice and the device in the original form is in common use today.

Came East
After the death of Mrs. Rognvaldson, he came east to make his home with his sons, Gordon and Clarence, at Acton.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and Acton United Church. Mr. Rognvaldson was a careful craftsman and until the last few months worked regularly in his workshop. A specialty of his was the making of spinning wheels and he received orders regularly from distant points in Canada and the United States as well as locally.

He had been in ill health for the past four months.

Surviving are sons and daughters: Herbert, Elliott, Lake, Mabel.

Mrs. William Dells, Hecla, Manitoba, Gordon, Acton, Vera, Mrs. H. Bailey, Dundas, Clarence, Acton, Leta, Mrs. E. Gray, Thebes, Douglas, Bruce River, Alberta and Ellis, Galt, A. sister, Mrs. Lily Olsen, predeceased him.

Great-grandchildren
He had 20 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.
