Altogether 7,764 Halton students took part in the county music festivals this year, the annual report of the Halton Music Festival Association reveals. New sources of income were also reported as a difficulty by the secretary Mrs D E Martin.

Concern has been expressed by the Festival Committee as to its financial state at the conclusion of the 1958 Festivals. With the growth of the school population in the County and the wider scope of the Festivals each year, it is felt that new sources of income must be tapped to carry on the work.

The Festival Committee expressed its appreciation and thanks to School Boards, Teachers and parents for their co-operation in the organizing necessary for such a large number of participants and also for the use of the various auditoria for the seasons.

#### New Awards

A special thanks is given, the report said, to the Acton Home and School Association and to the John Milton Chapter of the I.O.E. Milton, for beautiful cups donated this year, and to the School Area No. 1, Township of Nassagaweya the Sarah Martin Chapter I.O.E. Milton, and the Duke of Devonshire Chapter I.O.E. Acton, for the very fine shields they donated. The Festival Committee purchased two new cups for the North Rural Festival and seventeen sets of medals were awarded in solo and duet classes.

This year Certificates were designed and made up to go out to the various choirs who won first and second places in the Festivals when the Cups and Shields are removed from the schools at the end of the year, to go into competition again.

#### Three Districts

This year the County was divided into three districts — North Halton Rural, North Halton Urban and South Halton Urban, each one conducting its own Festival. These districts are co-ordinated by a central office in Milton.
