Here's a mouth-watering jam as you'll ever sign, seal and store away in your preserves cupboard. Try this Pineapple and Strawberry Jam - you can be sure of its perfect set, sure it will be a family favourite, too.

PINEAPPLE AND STRAWBERRY JAM

4 cups prepared fruit (1 ripe pineapple and about 1 qt. ripe strawberries)
2 cups (1 lb.) sugar
1/4 bottle Certo fruit pectin

First, prepare the fruit. Pare 1 medium-sized fully ripe pineapple. Grind or chop very fine. (Or use 2 1/2 cups canned crushed pineapple). Crush thoroughly about 1 quart fully ripe strawberries. Combine fruits. Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan. Then make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan, mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in Certo at once. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, and to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 10 medium glasses.
