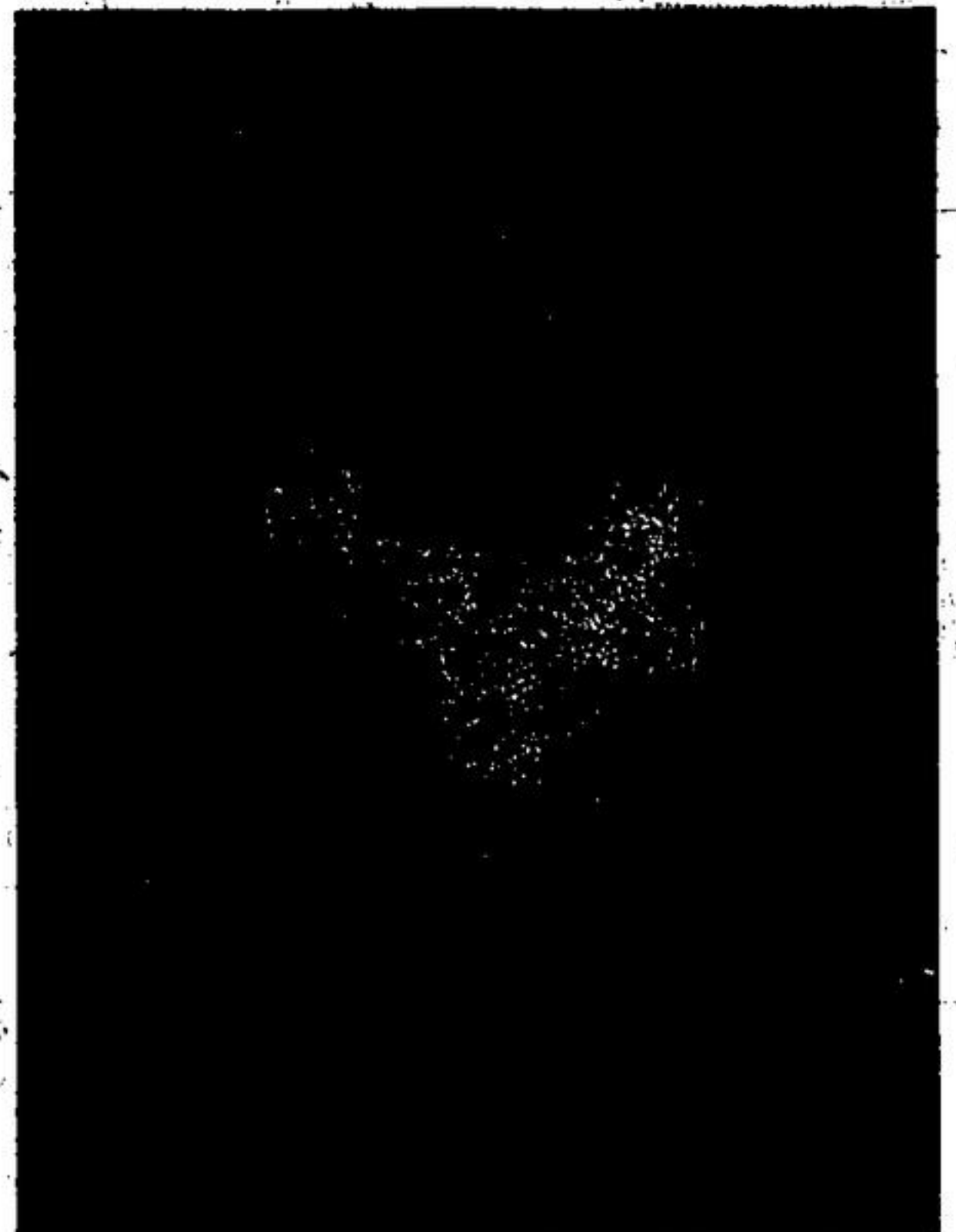
### Breakfast and Reception

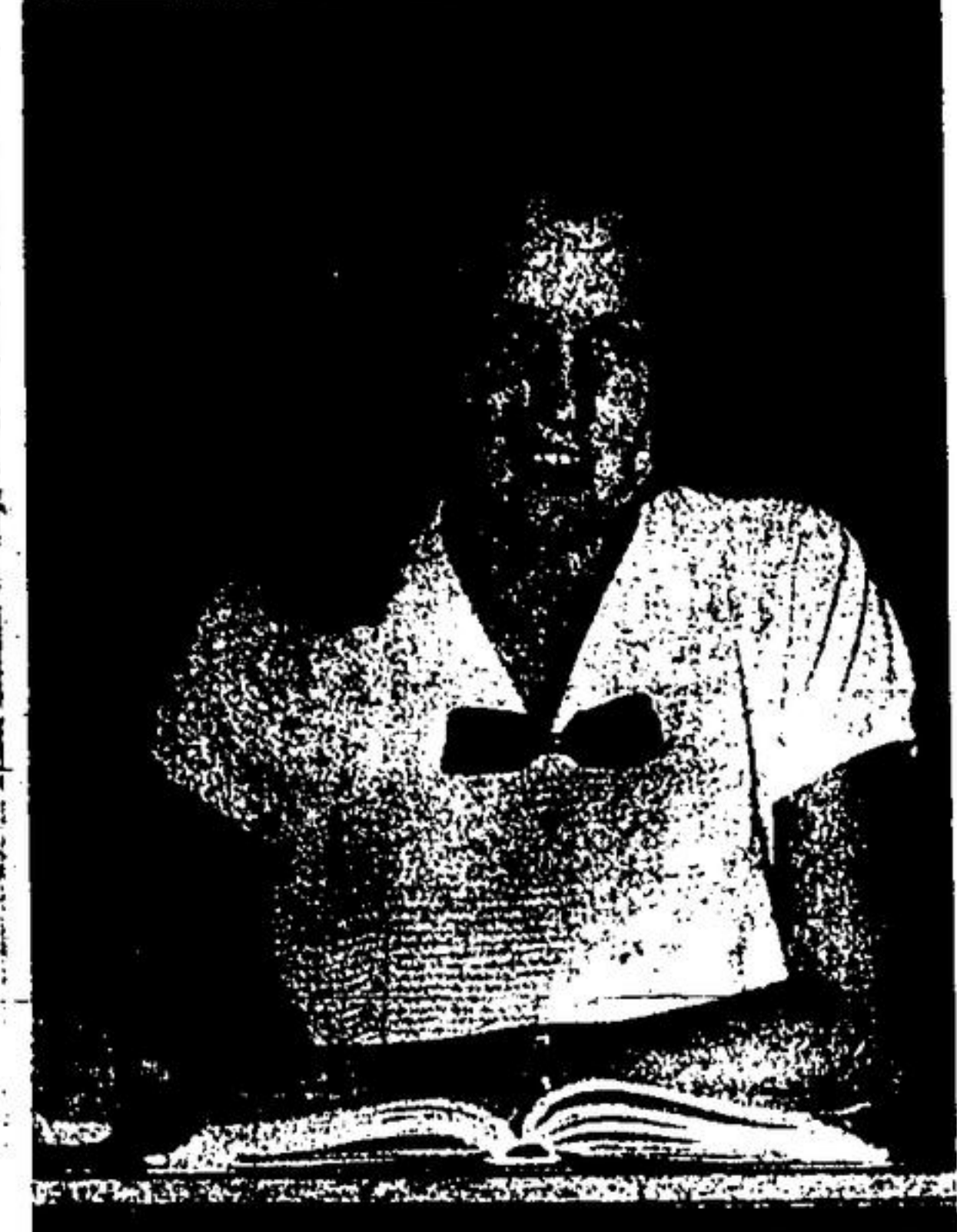
