Circus Cancels Engagement Rotarians Forced to Refund

The Acton Rotary Club received a setback in their Crippled Children's welfare plans when a long distance phone call from Garden Brothers Circus informed them the show scheduled for Acton today (Thursday) had been cancelled. The caller informed the Rotarians that a series of unfortunate and unforeseen events had taken place which would prevent the circus from appearing in Acton. Members of the Acton Rotary Club have spent many dreary hours ironing out last minute details for the big show and also on the advance sale of tickets. Rotarians report the advance sale was most gratifying and now the refund of ticket holders' money means additional work for the members.

Disappointment Nailed E. A. Hansen, club president, noted that the Rotarians do not begrudge the time and effort spent on this project but pointed out the great disappointment felt when, through means beyond their own control, the whole deal fell through. "It is a great disappointment to us as a club and to all Actonians who were looking forward with anticipation to the appearance of the circus," Mr. Hansen said. In spite of the setback, Acton Rotarians are not discouraged and on Wednesday of this week, they transported Gary Crispin of Acton to Wood End Camp at London where he will join other crippled children for a two week holiday at the Rotary club camp.

Approve Accounts The following accounts were approved for payment: Police 28.85, Administration 146.96, Fire 104.04, Welfare 62.27, Buildings 21.51, Roads 22,181.06. Pressure Shortage In presenting the committee reports, Reeve J. H. Goy informed council that a recent meeting of the Sewer and Water committee had reviewed a letter from the Canadian Underwriters Association to Metro Plastics in Acton pointing out the inadequacy of the water supply to the sprinkler system and if it was not regulated insurance rates would have to be adjusted. Mr. Goy informed council that water pressure on the sprinkler heads at the Metro plant was only 12 pounds and his committee agreed that further investigating was necessary. The chairman also reported a meeting of his committee when water rate increases were discussed. He stated no decision had been finalized, during the three and a half hour meeting.
