A well-known district farmer who retired in Acton, William George Gamble passed away at his home, 21 Park Ave., Acton, on Wednesday, June 17. He and his wife, who survives him, moved to town 14 years ago. He was 88 years of age.

Mr. Gamble, who was born on May 5, 1871, in Erin Township, was the son of John Gamble and Elizabeth Kennedy. He was married on October 4, 1893 to Mary E. Johnston and they had two sons, Clarence E. of Acton and Albert E. of R.R. 2, Hespeler. Also remaining are two grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Funeral service was held at the Rumley-Shoemaker Funeral Home on Friday, June 18, with Rev. Gordon Adams in charge. Interment followed in Fairview cemetery.

Pallbearers were a grandson, Dr. Edwin Gamble, and nephews Edwin and Arthur Gamble, Orwell, Gordon and Lloyd Johnston.

The couple celebrated their 85th wedding anniversary last October, and Mr. Gamble was out to vote earlier this month.

Mr. Gamble is the last surviving member of his family.

The Royal train will arrive at the C.N.R. station there at 4:25 p.m. Local officials will be presented to her there.

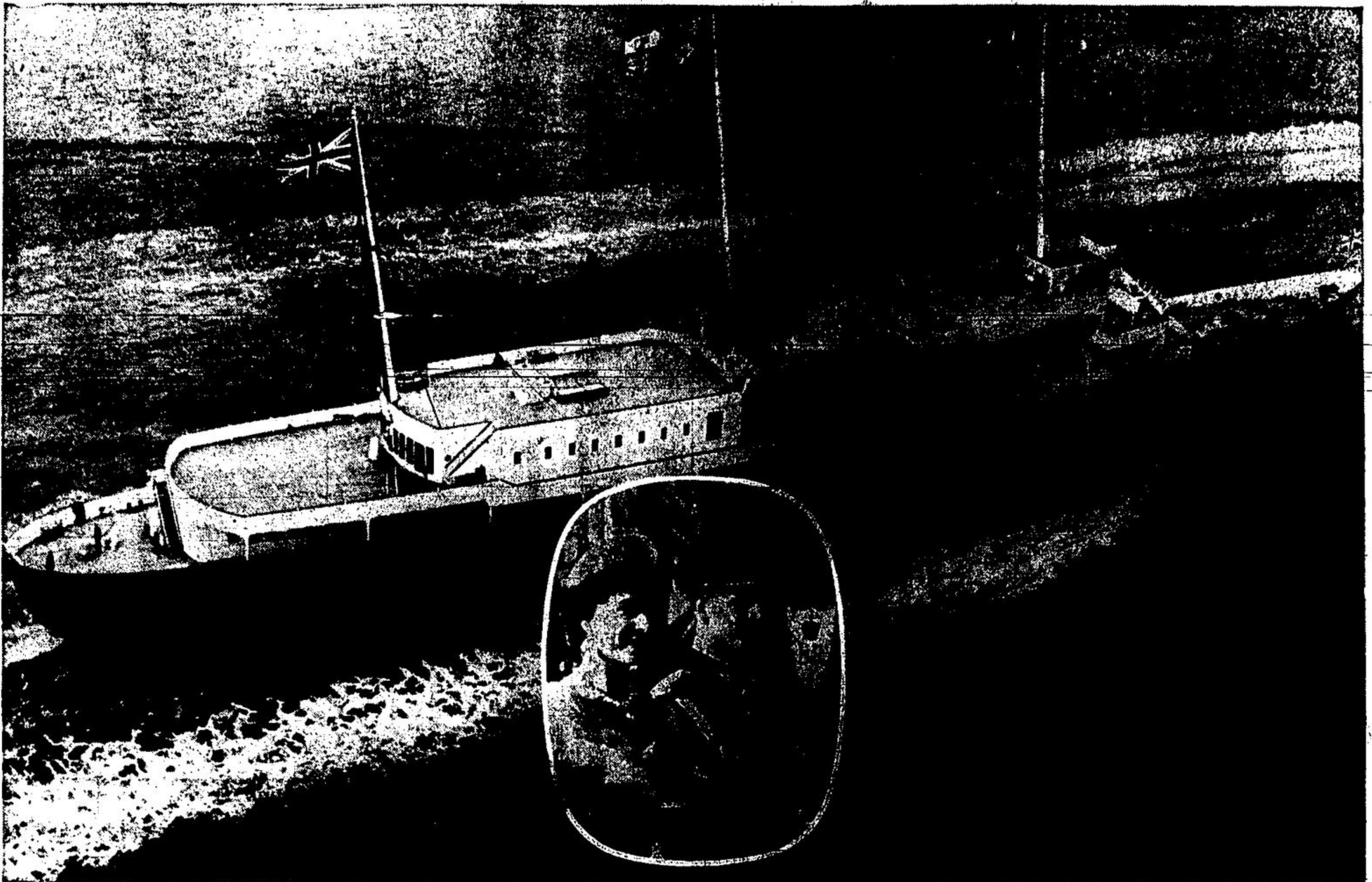

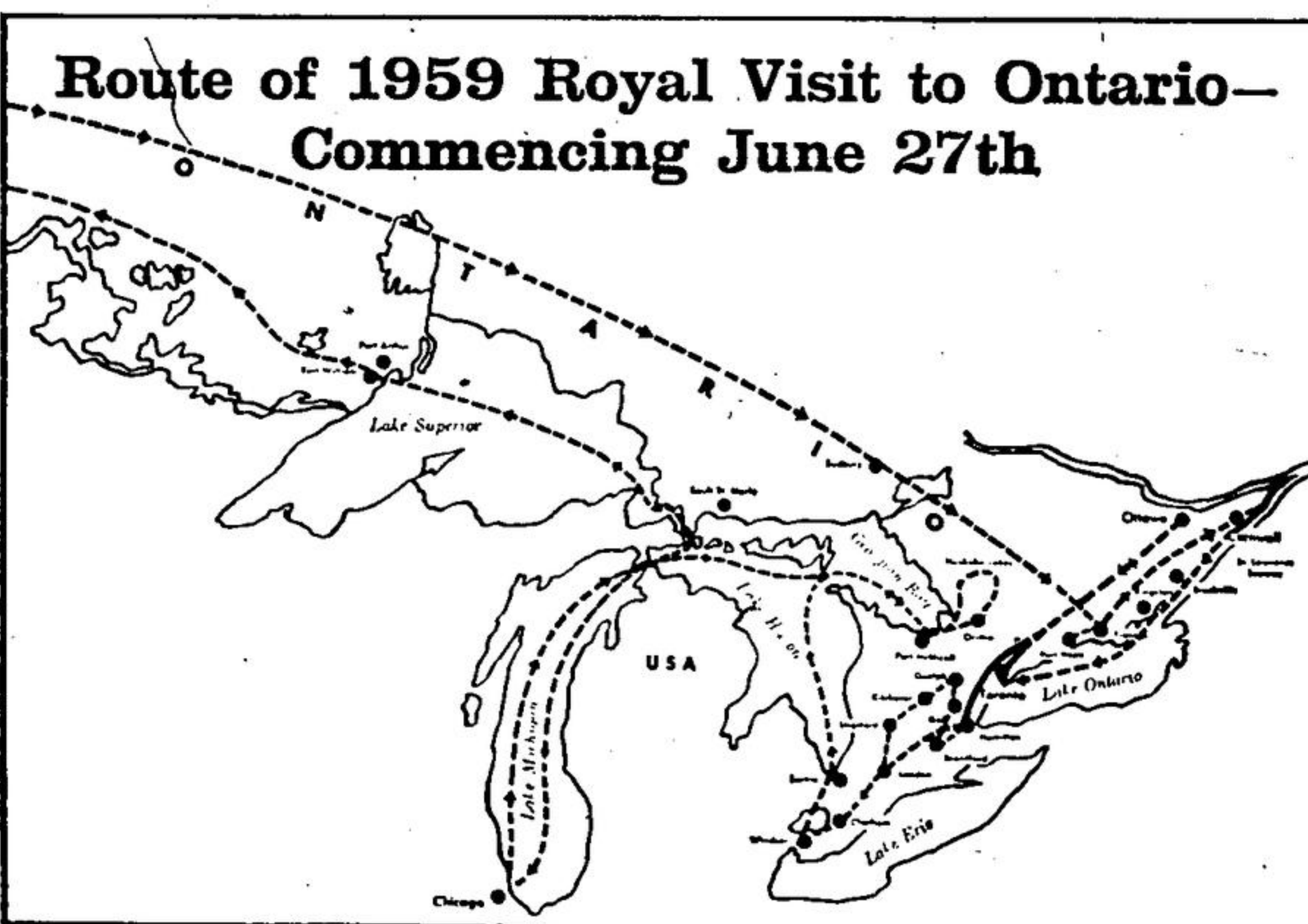
The city will be gaily decorated for the occasion and likely many from Acton will be joining in welcoming Her Majesty.
