Following the dinner and presentations, Dianne Newton led the group in a sing-song.

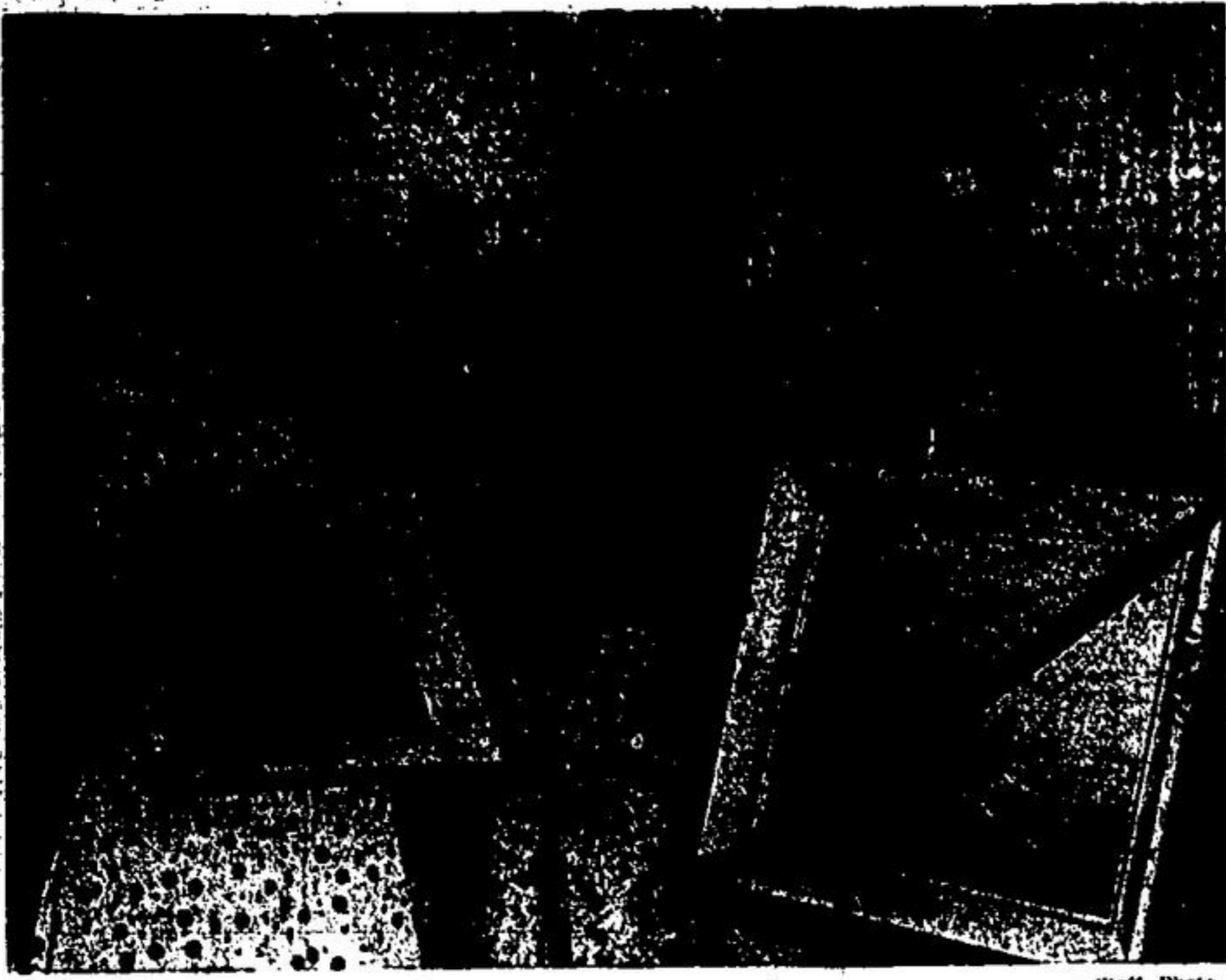
### Graduating Class

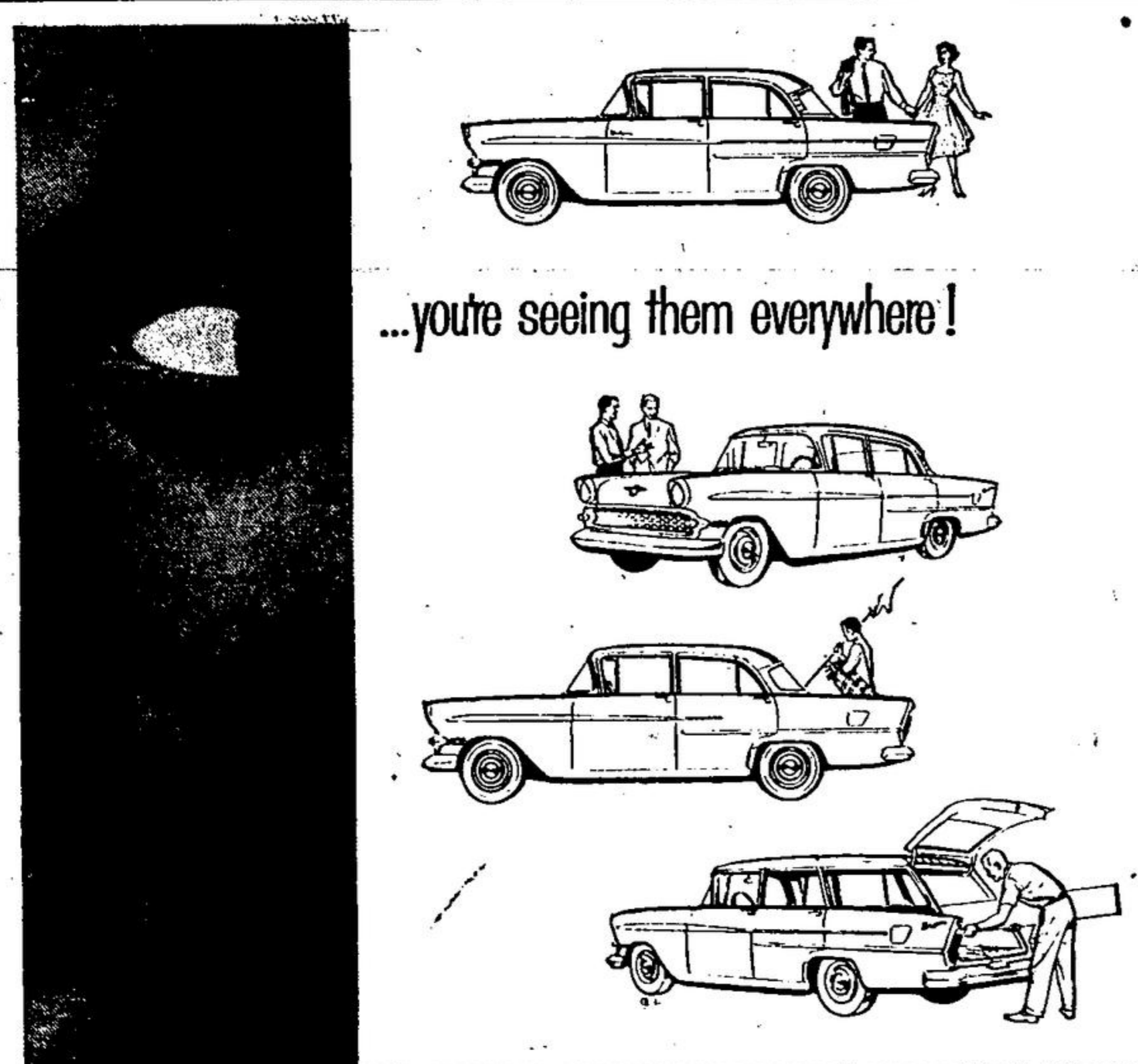
