

## Thistles Prick Nicols Edge 13-10 Lacrosse Win

With Big Jack Mann pumping five goals past Nicols netminder, Jim Rutledge, Fergus Thistles handed Acton a 13-10 defeat Saturday in front of the largest crowd to sit in at a boxla till here this semester.

The Nicols, clad in their bright new red and white uniforms extended the Fergus club, last year's intermediate-champions, right up to the final bell and with a little more practice could end up taking the best teams in the loop. They rang up an early 5-1 lead on the Thistles who immediately changed goal tenders, putting Jim Robertson in, in place of the juvenile netminder who started off.

That changed the complexion of the game, Robertson holding the Acton club down while Jack Mann and Bill Doble started to click down floor. Score at the end of the first chapter was 6-5 for Fergus.

The teams traded goals in the second period with Mann potting two and Grassy and Garbutt notching the Acton goals.

Come the third period and a vigorous Acton attack backfired as Scarrow put the Thistles two up only to have Tailfefer, playing one of his best games this season, score his second goal and put the Nicols back in contention.

Two quick Fergus goals put the Thistles back in the driver's seat and then Al Garbutt made it 1-0 on a neat goal that saw him thread

his way right through the visitors. Jim Rutledge, who seemed to be on another shot making it 12-9 off his game on long shots, fanned and then Freddy Kentner snared Larry Tailfefer's pass and made no mistake with a snapshot. It was 12-10.

A free throw awarded to Bob Doble of the visitors was cashed and Fergus held on until the final whistle.

In the first period it was Barry Insoe and playing coach Al Garbutt who provided the scoring punch for Acton, each racking up a pair of goals and leading a fast attack. Tailfefer accounted for the first Acton tally.

Eighteen penalties were served with each team getting nine.

Al Garbutt once again led the Nicols scoring parade with four goals while Barry Insoe and Larry Tailfefer notched a pair each and Kentner and Grassy got singletons.

**Boxla Banter** — Acton missed the services of high-scoring Johnny Krackp in this game but introduced home-brew Wayne Arbic and he could have had a couple of goals with any luck. Tailfefer, Insoe and Garbutt looked like the three stars for Acton while Mann, Doble and Robertson shone for the Thistles. The Nicols could use a manager on the bench to keep the lines fresh. Several Fergus goals were scored Saturday against tired players. The arena could also use a bell to indicate a period end.

Most of them Mohawk Indians, from the Okwaken reserve, they clipped the locals 10-6 in a nip and tuck struggle that once more saw the Nicols fade in the last few minutes after trading goal for goal and bump for bounce through most of the 60 minutes.

Delayed by the late arrival of net-minding equipment from Brantford, the game was a hard checking affair blemished by only 10 penalties. The Switsons displayed their swift attack to good advantage while the Nicols couldn't seem to get untracked until well into the second stanza.

Powless, a tower of strength on defence for the visitors, and a lion on the attack, pivoted Switson's fast-breaking forwards, scoring four goals and being robbed on countless more occasions by the standout netminding of Acton's Jim Rutledge. He was matched almost by high-scoring Al (Cowboy) Garbutt of the Nicols who plunked in a hat trick. Until midway in the second session it was almost only "Cowboy" against the Indians. Then Hilson found the mark and pushed in a pair, followed by a much-improved Larry Tailfefer who sniped a single.

## Rescind Lacrosse Rules To End Fans' Confusion

Fans in Acton who have been confused at the number of new rulings introduced in lacrosse games this season will be happy to know some of them were only on trial.

Referees, equipped with the 1959 code, were often as confused as fans and penalty time keepers were beyond confusion if reached in exasperation with them.

Relief is here, however, for Acton Nicols and the opposition, following a recent meeting of the Ontario Lacrosse Association executive.

**Rules Rescinded**

The current rules which have been the cause of the trouble, have been rescinded and will be changed as from July 6. The rescinded rules will cover all rules on trial involving delayed penalties and replacement on the floor following a goal — goals being scored.

A goal being scored following a penalty will have no influence on the penalty. The club concerned will be allowed to replace the player until the penalty has been served in full.

The only time a delayed penalty will enter a game will be an occasion in which a team is three men short at one time. The delayed penalty in this event will not begin until the first or second player has served his time penalty. Minor penalties will take precedence. This change was brought about by the clubs and was interpreted as being in the best interests of lacrosse in the east.

## Campbellville Ready for Stars

This Sunday—Campbellville will be the site of the league all-star intermediate game for the first time. It is probably the first time the game has been played outside Oakville. It is certainly the first time that Campbellville's team has played the all-stars from the rest of the league.

Going into this interesting encounter, Campbellville is leading the league with 17 wins against two defeats. They also won a pre-season exhibition game against Guelph so they have a season's record of 18 wins and two losses.

A change in the goalkeeper penalty was also put into force. Under the new ruling, any minor penalty imposed on a goalkeeper, incurred in his crease or outside his crease, will be served by another player on the floor at the time. However, a major penalty or misconduct, imposed on a goal keeper must be served by the keeper himself, with the usual five minute time allowance permitted to cover change in equipment.

The nine foot rule on a free throw has been retained.
