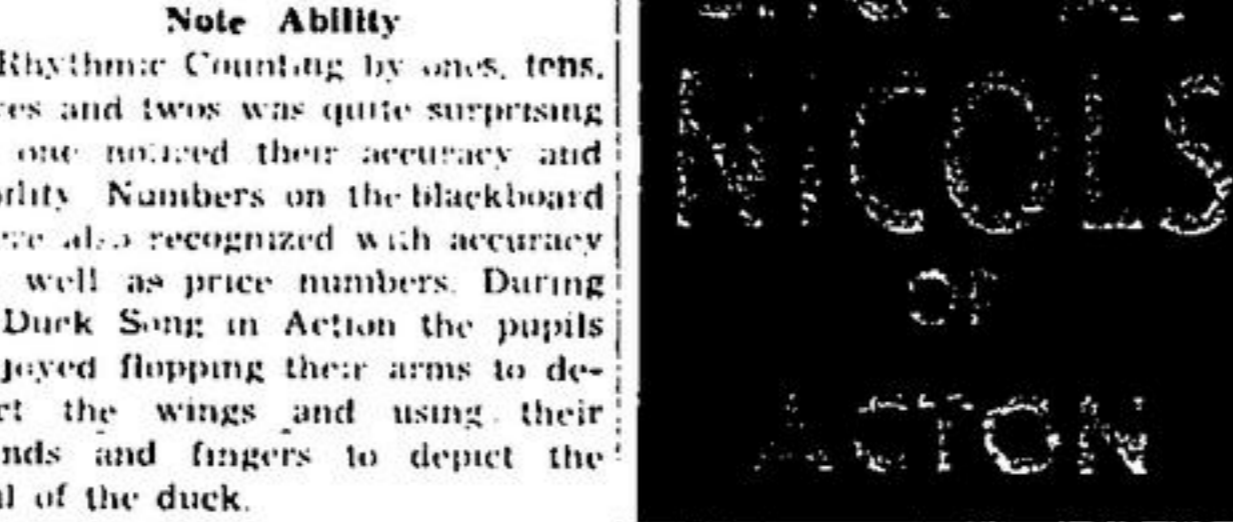
**Weather, Day Cards**

**Old Landmark Once Hostelry**

A somewhat shabby but familiar landmark is gone with the demolition of what is believed to have been one of the earliest hostels in passenger days. Situated on the Guelph Rd. at the Wellington and Hutton Counties town line, it seems quite probable that it was a stopping place for travellers a century and more ago.

The Guelph Rd. was the main route up from Port Nelson and continued on up the 4th Lane of Eramosa to the Indian Trail (passing past Armstrong's Mills in Guelph Township. At this early date, 1819, on there was no village of Eden Mills or Rockwood.

There were many small buildings on the Guelph Rd. where a traveller on foot or horseback could rest. None remain today and this last one to go though shabby, with age is the last link of its kind in the district.

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
