—Beauty at its best is the correct term for Acton Park the past few weeks. The grass is kept mowed and the benches arranged in order to present a scenic view.

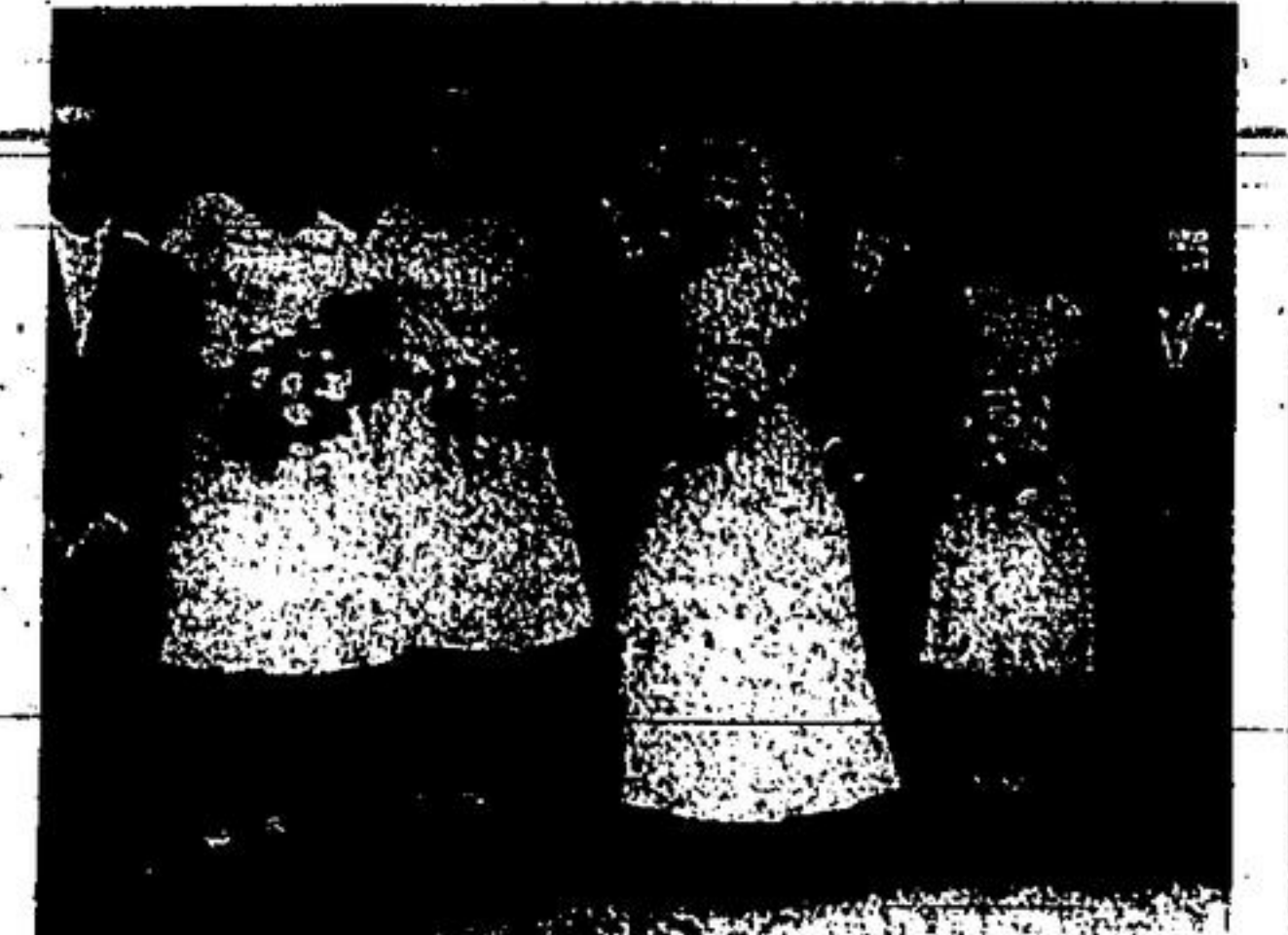
—Some from this district attended the "monster garden party" at Hornby last Saturday. There were about 2,000 there altogether. The annual event is sponsored by the ball clubs.
