

No Negligence on Part on Board In Accidental Drowning Verdict

of Dr. W. G. C. Kenney, who had arrived at the scene of the accident later. He said he was called and arrived at the park at 8:05 p.m. Volunteers worked to revive the boy for an hour and ten minutes. The coroner also stated there were no marks on the child's body and all indications pointed to death by drowning.

Fire Chief Jack Newton informed the jurors and counsel he had been requested on the day of the drowning to put the department's loud-speaker system installed in a car into use in an attempt to locate the lost youngster. The chief noted the time he received the call at 8:15 p.m.

Human Chain

It was also pointed out that firemen organized a human chain in the swimming area. When a search failed to locate the boy a call was put in for the fire truck with drug-giving equipment and resuscitators.

George Hargrave, a member of the local St. John Ambulance Brigade, informed the Crown Attorney he and his wife were on duty at the swimming area the day of the drowning but pointed out the Brigade was not expected by the Acton Parks Board to act as life guards.

Mr. Hargrave informed the crown he and his wife had been notified by Mrs. Lalonde about 4 p.m. that their child had been missing for about an hour and immediately organized search parties in the park area.

Search by Boat

Constable Bob Moreau of the local O.P.P. Detachment recalled having been summoned to the park at 4:40 p.m. After commanding a power boat he patrolled the lake in search of the youngster. After his patrol of the water the police man summoned the fire chief.

Constable Moreau informed the Crown Attorney he often swam in Fairy Lake and had failed to find anything he believed as dangerous. He also pointed out that there were no lifeguards at the swimming area but it was seldom children were not supervised by their parents in the water.

H. R. Parker, chairman of the parks board, listed the various changes which had taken place at the park this year in an attempt to improve the park.

Red Cross Survey

In presenting the brief compiled by the Red Cross Water Safety Service, Mr. McMartin noted the following had been found at the swimming area when the survey had been made at the request of the Crown Attorney:

ON THE BEACH:
1. A sign slating "Not responsible—Swim at your own risk".

2. Signs along the road in the swimming area "No Parking".

3. No signs indicating that this is a dangerous area with stumps beneath the water and a dangerous deep drop-off.

4. That there is an admission charged to enter the park on weekends for use of the facilities there.

5. There is a gateway to the beach area from the road.

WATER AREA:

1. Buoy lines running north to south across the water designating an area where people can swim and where boats must slow down.

2. That there was a structure in the water which encouraged diving into dangerous murky water.

CONCLUSION:

With the conditions as such in the beach area and water area, Ontario Division, Canadian Red Cross Water Safety Service, feels that:

1. Swimming is encouraged even if dangerous.

2. The wording of the sign is unfair because the average person cannot assess the area as a dangerous one. The sign encourages rather than discourages.

3. There is danger here far beyond the normal risk, and no precautions have been taken.

Made Recommendations

Recommendations contained in the brief as outlined by the Red Cross officials included:

In view of the existing conditions at Fairy Lake, Acton, we would make the following recommendations:

1. Hire qualified lifeguards to supervise the swimming area. A minimum of two guards should be on duty during peak periods (Saturdays, Sundays). Supervised swimming periods should be clearly indicated on the shore sign.

2. The area should be sounded to determine depths of water, drop-offs and other potential dangers. Investigate removal of underwater obstructions.

3. Once these soundings have been completed the area should be buoyed as follows:

(a) You may use three steel loops six inches in diameter, joined by half inch rope.

(b) Commercial marker buoys may be purchased if desired.

4. Signs in the water indicating the depth at the three foot level and signs at the five foot level saying "Deep Water" would indicate the water depths for the public.

Limiting signs should be placed at each end of the swimming beach saying "No Swimming Beyond This Point".

A sign on the beach, preferably mounted on a guard tower, indicating rules for the swimming area should be established.

5. A shore tower for a lifeguard should be built on the beach to overlook the swimming area.

6. A Lifeguard board, a guard tower, or guard raft for the water area should be established. In the case of the guard tower or raft, it is imperative that it be hauled in and locked to a shore base when not in use. No diving should be allowed in this area unless under supervision during a swimming class.

7. Establish an emergency search system which would involve police, doctor, and fire department. In case of suspected drownings, the search system should go into operation immediately.

8. Attempt to start an instructional programme in swimming and water safety for the education of children and parents in the community.

A reading taken from an English Home and Country magazine on "Speaking to One's Own Institute" was given by Mrs. C. Aitken.


A contest on guessing articles conducted by Miss E. Pearson was won by Mrs. C. Aitken.
