Whit pretty school teacher Miss Yvonne Brunelle will be teaching the same fundamentals of arithmetic and literature this September, but it will be in a completely different setting. For the past few years she has been on the staff of Ryerson public school in Toronto, but this fall, when the term starts and the campers start filing into the classrooms, she will be at a desk at the Royal Canadian Air Force base at Baden-Baden, Germany.

Miss Brunelle will be on the school staff there for two years. Her pupils will be the children of Canadian air force personnel, and all the arrangements for her new job were made through the Air Force here.

She will be living right on the base and thinks she will likely be teaching a grade four.

Canadian teachers regularly have to teach in Europe, and this year Miss Brunelle is acquainted with some who are going like herself. Some will begin the same basic job as is however.

After finishing public and high school in Acton, she went to the Teachers' College in Toronto, graduating in 1953.
