

### Tremendous Zeal and Devotion Shown by Mormons—Rev. Moore

Continuing with his series, "Rivals of the Christian Faith", the Rev. G. A. B. Moore of the United Church in Rockwood discussed that of the Mormons or "The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints."

He began by remarking about the tremendous zeal and devotion shown by this sect. This could be seen in the appointing of their missionaries who for two or four years had to defray their own expenses while studying and also to obey completely very strict rules. There are an estimated 800,000 members of this body.

**Church Founder**  
Founder of the Mormon church was Joseph Smith, who was born in Vermont in 1805. He was illiterate, of old New England stock.

As a boy he was given to fancies and dreams and he suffered from epilepsy. When still a boy, his family moved to New York state and he came under the influence of various missionaries. He said he had visions and when 15 years old, claimed he was called by God as a prophet.

He again claimed when he was 21 years old, in 1826, that an angel visited him, giving him the exact location of some gold plates. On the basis of the contents of these plates, he published "The Book of Mormon". The inscriptions on the gold plates were supposed to have been "reformed Egyptian".

**Traces Beginning**  
Mr. Moore traced the beginnings of the Mormon sect, which was founded in Fayette, New York, and later moved to Ohio, then Missouri. Victims of community pressure because of their teachings, riots and lynchings followed them. They were firm believers in the old adage, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth."

In Missouri they displayed great zeal in transforming the wilderness until the land was like the proverbial "Garden of Eden." No one else wanted the places where they settled. By their industry they accomplished much.

Joseph Smith was eventually jailed in Carthage, Illinois, and mob, breaking into the jail, murdered him. Brigham Young then led the believers to what is now the state of Utah.

**Travel West**  
This leader encouraged them in their great ordeal of travelling west with its many hardships by having a brass band and a special song, well known today, "Come Ye Saints". They marched forward to this hymn.

Brigham Young encouraged polygamy and Joseph Smith Jr., who broke away from this branch, practiced monogamy. Utah was only admitted as a state in the union in 1896 on the condition that polygamy be abolished.

Mr. Moore commented that only eight persons are supposed to have seen the plates with the inscriptions supposedly translated by Joseph Smith with the aid of two crystals found with the plates.

**Gigantic Fraud**  
"It is a gigantic forgery as full of frauds as a sponge is of holes," he said. It has quotations from Shakespeare, confessions from a 17th century volume and quotations from the King James version of the Bible. The theory of polygamy was used to increase their numbers.

The Mormons talked of celestial marriage with monogamy on earth and polygamy in heaven. This is related in St. Matthew, chapter 22, verse 22.

They damned everyone unless they belonged to the Mormon sect. Their teachings replace the simple faith of Christ, Mr. Moore finished.

Organist for the service was David Benham. Soloist was Marc Somerville, who sang "Think On Me."

Mr. Moore gave a very warm welcome to Mr. Somerville, mentioning that he is an earnest student who will be studying this fall at the University of Toronto. Mr. Somerville is a grandson of the Rev. Charles Jolliffe, Rockwood.

### Exhibition's Stage Is 210 Ton Monster

The Canadian National Exhibition's stage, a 210 ton monster, moving on 10 electrically controlled caterpillars, trends lightly on the new football playing field at the Exhibition Grounds. In spite of its size and weight, it makes less of a dent in the grass than a 125 pound woman with high-heeled shoes. The stage's pressure is only 6 1/2 pounds per square inch.

Jack Arthur, executive producer of Canadiana '59, this year's Grandstand Show, says that the portable stage is the same size as the fixed stage of other years. This is acknowledged to be the largest outdoor stage in the world.

**Three Turntables**  
There is 1,200 square feet of floor space on the stage and a proscenium opening of 180 feet and 80 feet deep. The stage is also fitted with three turntables similar to those which existed in the former grandstand stage.

Covering the rear 50 feet of the stage is a roof to protect the performers and settings from the weather. At this point the world's largest stage curtain hangs, 150 wide and 40 feet high.

Panel is built at the rear of the stage and reach to the roof which at this point is 28 feet high. The stage is completely equipped with lights, catwalks and curtain drops. Margison and Associates are the builders of the stage.

**Staged Arrog**  
Need for the portable stage arose when the CNE signed a contract with the Argonaut football club to use the grandstand as its home stadium for Big Four Football.

The novelty of the moveable stage is such that Jack Arthur plans on moving it off the field, with his cast in action as the finale of the show. Cost of the aluminum and steel monster was \$450,000.

### MANY SEE FILMS

Toronto—Conservation lectures, many of them illustrated with films, given by Ontario Department of Lands and Forests personnel across the province in May were attended by 32,429 persons, 13,471 at 135 school talks and 18,958 at 308 public meetings.

### Assess Home Builders For Lack of Industry

GEORGETOWN—An amendment to Georgetown's subdivision by-law, giving a subdivider the alternative of a cash per lot payment in lieu of maintaining a 40 per cent. industrial-commercial assessment ratio was passed by council Monday.

The new legislation provides that prior to application for a building permit, the subdivider shall deposit \$400 for each lot for which a permit is to be issued.

**Rebate on \$1,000**  
If in a 2 1/2 year period the 40 per cent. ratio is not maintained, the town can use the deposit for retiring debts incurred by capital school costs. For each \$1,000 of new industrial-commercial assessment attributed to the subdivider during this period, he will receive a rebate of \$100. If such assessment should be in excess of the ratio, the town will issue a credit which can be used in future subdivisions or is transferable by the subdivider.

### Century-Old House May Soon Disappear

OAKVILLE—One of the oldest houses in the Oakville district may make way for a three-storey apartment building if the necessary approval can be secured. Albert M. Mordean, 129 Suffolk Drive, applied for the rezoning of the old Mordean homestead at the corner of Lakeshore Highway and Suffolk Drive. The house on the property, which has been converted into four apartments, is more than 100 years old.

Mr. Mordean presented a colored sketch of the 36-apartment structure which B. E. T. Ellis, Oakville architect, proposes to erect on the property which he now owns.

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### "Old Lonesome George" Gobel Many Stars Headline Ex Show

Jack Arthur, producer of the C.N.E. Grandstand Show, has a complete roster for this year's mammoth production.

The headliner is "ol' lonesome George" himself—George Gobel, the pint-sized television comic who has recently been packing them in to cabarets and theatres from the American Southwest to London Central.

**Eric House**—the well-known Canadian actor who plays Shakespeare and modern musical revue with equal success—will be another headliner. In a multi-colored role as actor, singer, M.C. and comic Eric has been appearing as "Public Opinion" in the Stratford Festival production of Offenbach's operetta "Orpheus in the Underworld."

**Lands on Hand**  
Alan and Blanche Lund are the star dancers in action, and once again, Alan is creating dance routines and devising staging.

In the same department, Midge Arthur is choreographing routines for her Canadettes—the corps of 50 girl dancers whose precision numbers have long been highlights of the annual extravaganza.

Janki and Arnat have been preceded by some of the finest reviews the trade has seen. Their "snake dance" act, which will be part of the Grandstand Show's first act, has brought on superlatives all over Europe and was called the show-stopper of Guy Lombardo's famous "Arabian Nights" at Jones Beach.

**Fine Tenor**  
Gino Donati, an Italian whose career started at La Scala, and scaled the heights via "Lido de Paris" show and Ed Sullivan, is another star who will be CNE property from August 26 to September 12th. The extent of his act is something of a secret until opening night, but it's no secret that he is one of the finest tenors to be heard today.

William Tabbert, who created the role of Lieutenant Cable in "South Pacific" will be another of the international stars—and one who is guaranteed to cause a considerable amount of fluttering among the ladies of the audience.

**Gratify Customers**  
The nimble-footed Taylor Twins will also be featured. These Oshawa boys have been making a fine name for themselves in the United States, and will now spend three weeks gratifying the customers close to home.

Varel and Balley, the French singing stars who are well known here through their records and television appearances, will add another note of internationalism. As the top "Tin-Pan-Alley" team of France, they will perform some of their own hit songs, with their own slick male chorus, "Les Chanteurs de Paris."

The comedy side of the show will be aided by Gil Miller and Arnold Archer, two Americans, known as the "Comedy Music Men," whose unique performance includes impressions of all the prominent musical instruments, accomplished entirely by voice.

**Oriental Comedy**  
An Oriental sequence will be Oriental not only by costume and choice of music. It will include Ming and Ling—the Oriental comics who have been stealing shows from under the noses of their Occidental cousins, and drawing comments like Ed Sullivan's terse "a sure-fire hit."

More funny business will come with Latona, Graham and Chadell—two Australians and a Scot who knock each other about in a manner proven to be hilarious.

Again, Howard Cable will be both arranger and conductor.

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**THE PRESERVING KETTLE**

Ever since Eve, we've found apples a tempting fruit. Try them in this perfect-setting, crisp flavoured Apple Jelly. Delicious!

**APPLE JELLY**  
5 cups juice (about 3 quarts ripe apples)  
7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar  
1/2 bottle Certo  
To prepare juice, Remove blossom and stem ends from about 3 quarts fully ripe apples. Cut in small pieces, but do not peel or core. (With soft, very sweet apples, add 2 tablespoons lemon juice.) Add 3 cups water, bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Crush with masher and simmer, covered, 5 minutes longer. Place in a jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 5 cups into a very large measuring cup.  
To make jelly, Add sugar to juice in saucepan, and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in Certo. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin. Make about 12 medium glasses.
