Former Hockey, Baseball Star Bus Morton Buried Wednesday

The sudden passing of Russell (Bus) Morton on Monday morning came as a shock to many Acton residents who knew the former baseball and hockey star, active in sport circles in town for many years.

Death came suddenly to the 40-year-old man while he was being transferred to Guelph General Hospital for observation and treatment after becoming suddenly ill at his work at Healdmore and Co. He had been employed there for over 25 years.

Born in Toronto, April 10, 1918, he moved to Acton in 1920 with his brother Norman, father and mother. He later Mr. and Mrs. John Morton. He immediately joined the junior hockey team starting on the forward line before moving up to the intermediate ranks.

In 1939, he was instrumental in helping to bring the Intermediate hockey championship to Acton, and will be remembered by many as a hard-working and flashy forward during the Durham series.

Baseball was also one of Bus Morton's favorite summer sports and he starred at third base, occasionally relieving on the pitcher's mound. In 1939, he was instrumental in helping to bring the Intermediate Sports for several years in coaching youngsters during the summer baseball season.
