The hall was decorated with white and pink streamers and white bells and baskets of summer flowers.

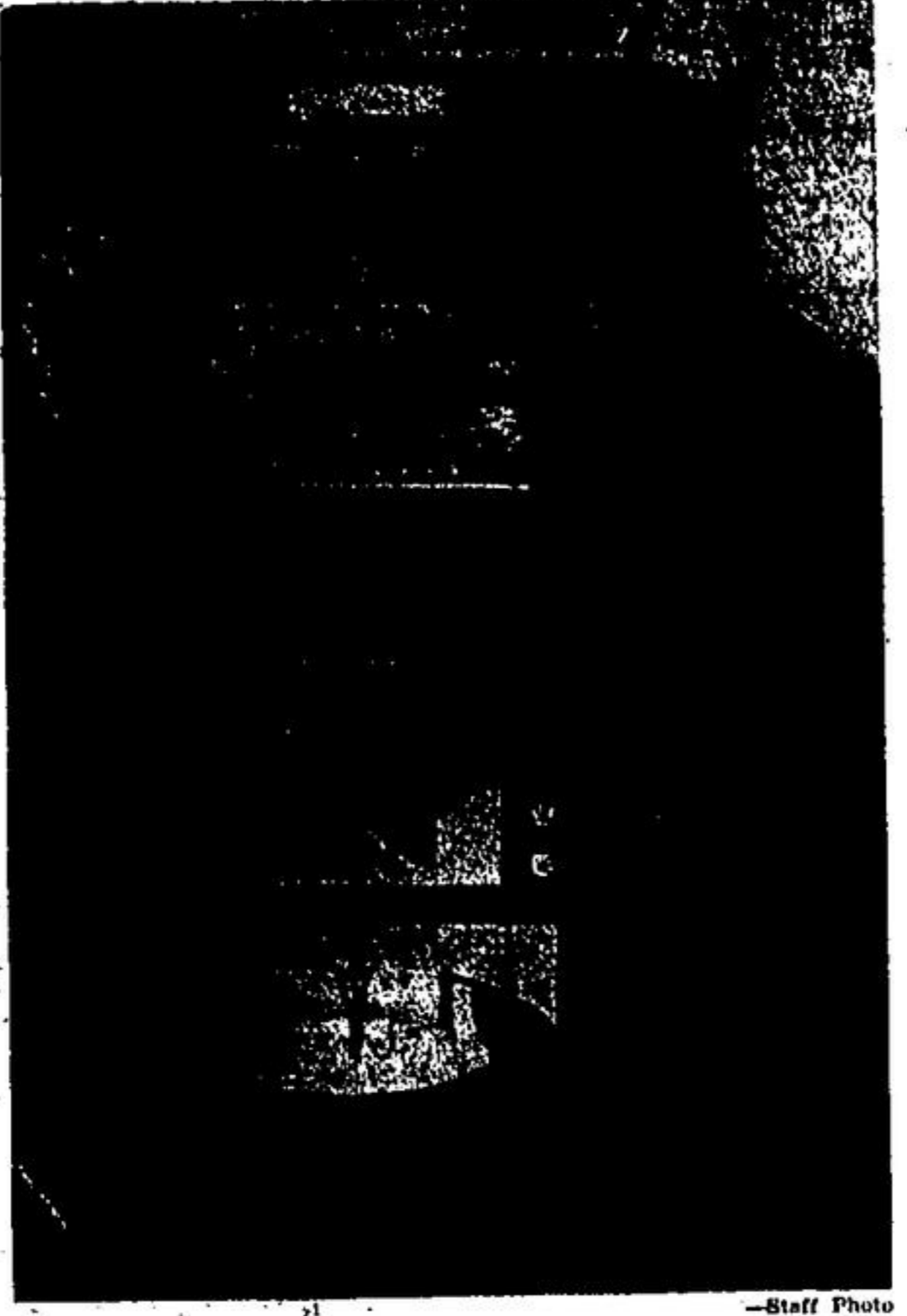
The bride's cake, set in tulle flanked with white candles in crystal candelabra, centred the bride's table. The bridal bouquets also graced the bride's table.
