List Restrictions For Game Bird Hunt

Migratory birds open season begins in Halton county and surrounding district at 12:00 noon, October 3 and ends on December 15. It was announced this week.

Limits are: in any day, six ducks exclusive of Merangers, of which not more than one may be a Wood Duck and not more than four may be Canvasbacks or Redheads; five Geese; 25 Rails, Coots or Gallinules; eight Wilson's Snipe; eight Woodcock.

Possession
Possession limits: 12 ducks, of which not more than eight may be Canvasbacks or Redheads; 10 Geese; 10 Wilson's Snipe; 10 Woodcock. If lawfully killed, they may be possessed from the time they are killed until August 31 next following.

Halton game warden Bob Reid added that guns must be ceased from one-half hour before sun-down to one-half hour after sun-up.

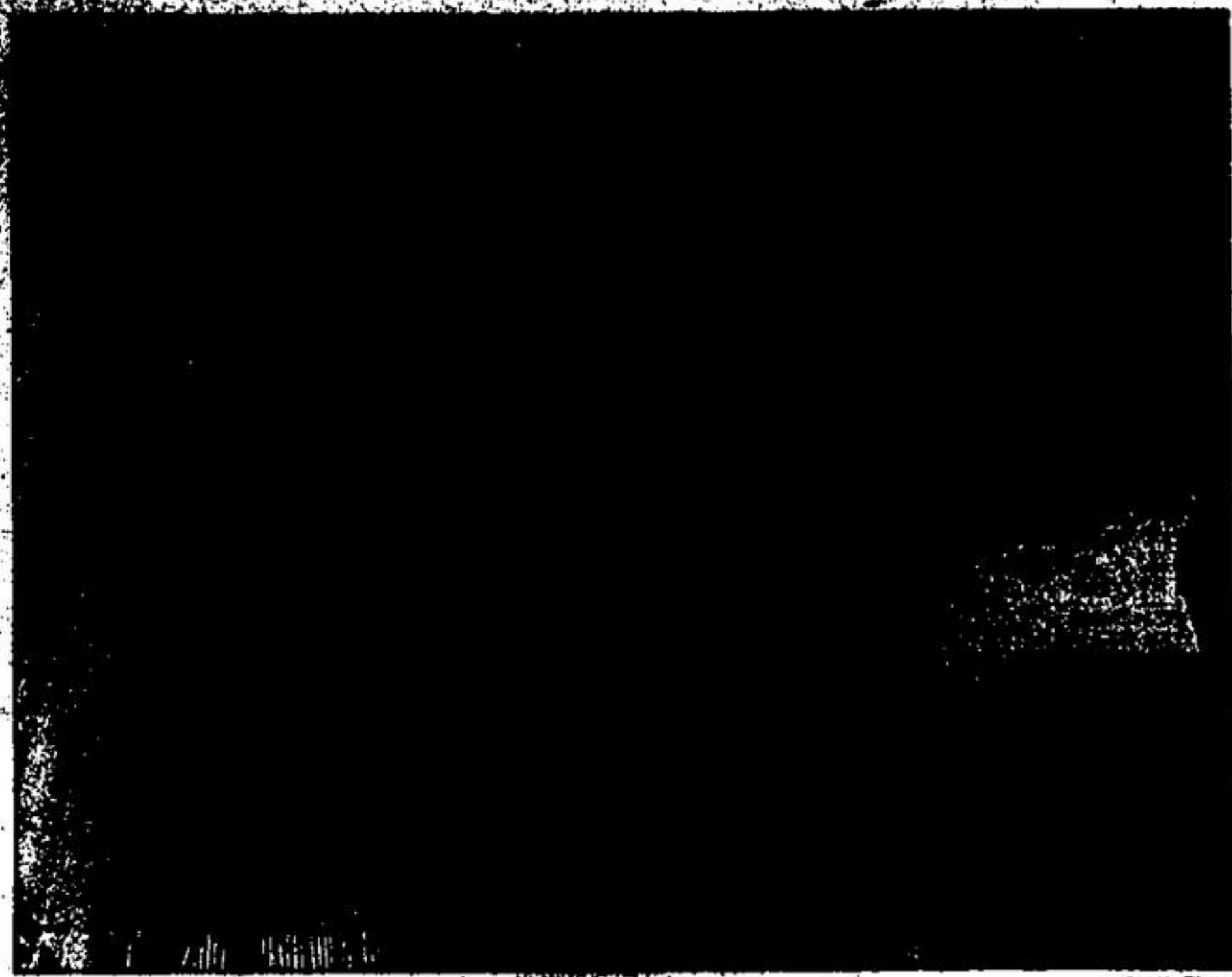
RUN HOUR GAME
