

## Weed Essay Competition On Schools' Fall Agenda

County Council is again pleased to sponsor a Weed Control Essay Competition for grades 6, 7 and 8 in the elementary schools of Halton, weed inspector V. J. McArthur announced recently.

For the purpose of the competition, the county is divided into 18 districts by municipalities with the two largest, the Town of Burlington and the Township of Trafalgar, having two districts each. The elementary schools are allowed to submit one essay per 100 pupils of enrollment. Entries are to be submitted to the inspector's offices where they will be given identification by a number and then forwarded to the committee for judging.

**Offer Prizes**  
Prizes are offered on the basis of first, \$10.00; second, \$3.00 and third, \$2.00, in each district. The first prize essays will then be forwarded to the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph, where the county winner will be chosen.
