Courses will consist of 12 two-hour lessons, commencing Monday and Tuesday, October 26 and 27, at 8:00 p.m., and each Monday and Tuesday following until November 30 and December 1, recommencing on January 11 and 12 and continuing on 12 February 15 and 16. The basic fee for all courses is \$6.00. Three Dollars of which must be forwarded with the Application Form. The balance of Three Dollars must be paid on Registration Night. Registration Night will be held at the High School on Friday, October 16, at 7:00 p.m., at which time the balance of fee must be paid and students will be given itemized lists of requirements for the first class.

A minimum of 15 applicants must be secured for each class. The Committee reserves the right to cancel or carry any class if wishes:

- (1) If you do not have a typewriter on which to practice, we strongly recommend rental of a machine. Enquire from instructor in relation.
- (2) The Welding course fee will be \$15.00. Five Dollars with application and the balance on Registration Night. This fee covers all equipment and supplies the student will need. The course is given at Lincoln Motors, Georgetown, and students must provide their own transportation.
- (3) The Leathercraft course will cover leather assembly and leather tooling or carving, whichever the student wishes. It is estimated that cost of equipment in the leather carving course only would be about \$20.00 for beginners. In all instances, students will pay for cost of materials used.
- (4) This course does not teach Shorthand, but covers only improving your speed and accuracy.
- (5) The Home Decorating Course will be given by Mr. Alex. Duncan of Duncan-McPhee of Guelph and the fee will be \$12.00. Six Dollars with application and the balance on Registration Night and there will be no further expense to the student. This course covers decorating problems, room planning, color scheme, floor designs, etc.
- (6) The Handyman's Course for Men and Women covers Do-It-Yourself projects for the home and a few lessons will be spent on minor electrical repairs. Bring your problems to the class.
