Recently it was my privilege to accompany the Agricultural Committee of Halton County on a visit to the neighboring County of Wel-

vided an apportunity to see something of the work they are doing In conservation and weed control In this article I will tell briefly of one or two highlights of the trip.

One very interesting stop was made at the Lake Belwood Forest Tree Nursery. This project was established in 1954 by the Grand River Valley Conservation Commission. Their job is growing trees from seed for transplanting in conservation areas. The manager seemed extremely interested in his work and made an excellent guide

He explained that first of all seeds from evergreens, hardwoods, nut trees and a -wide variety of ornamental shrubs are gathered in the fall of the year They are carefully dried, cleaned, graded and then stored in cold storage. 
