During the evening, the newcomers had an opportunity to see some of the section leaders in action as they demonstrated life saving techniques.

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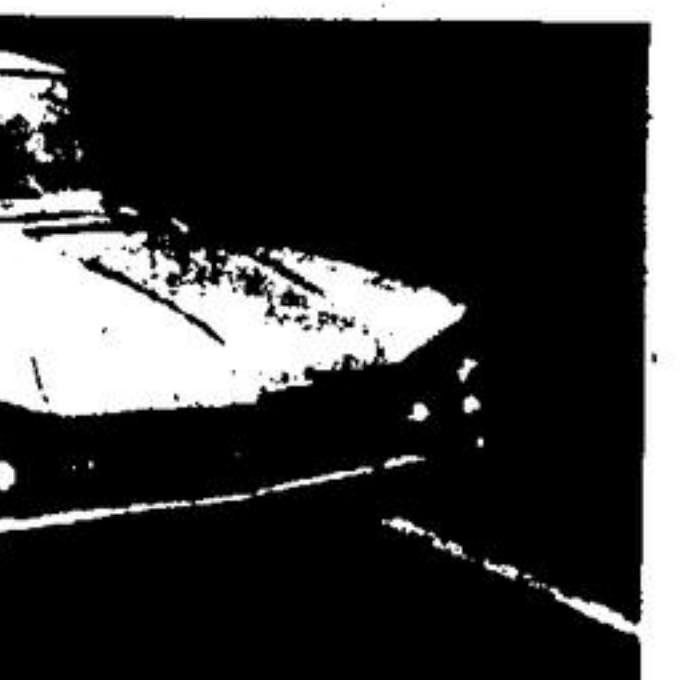
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
