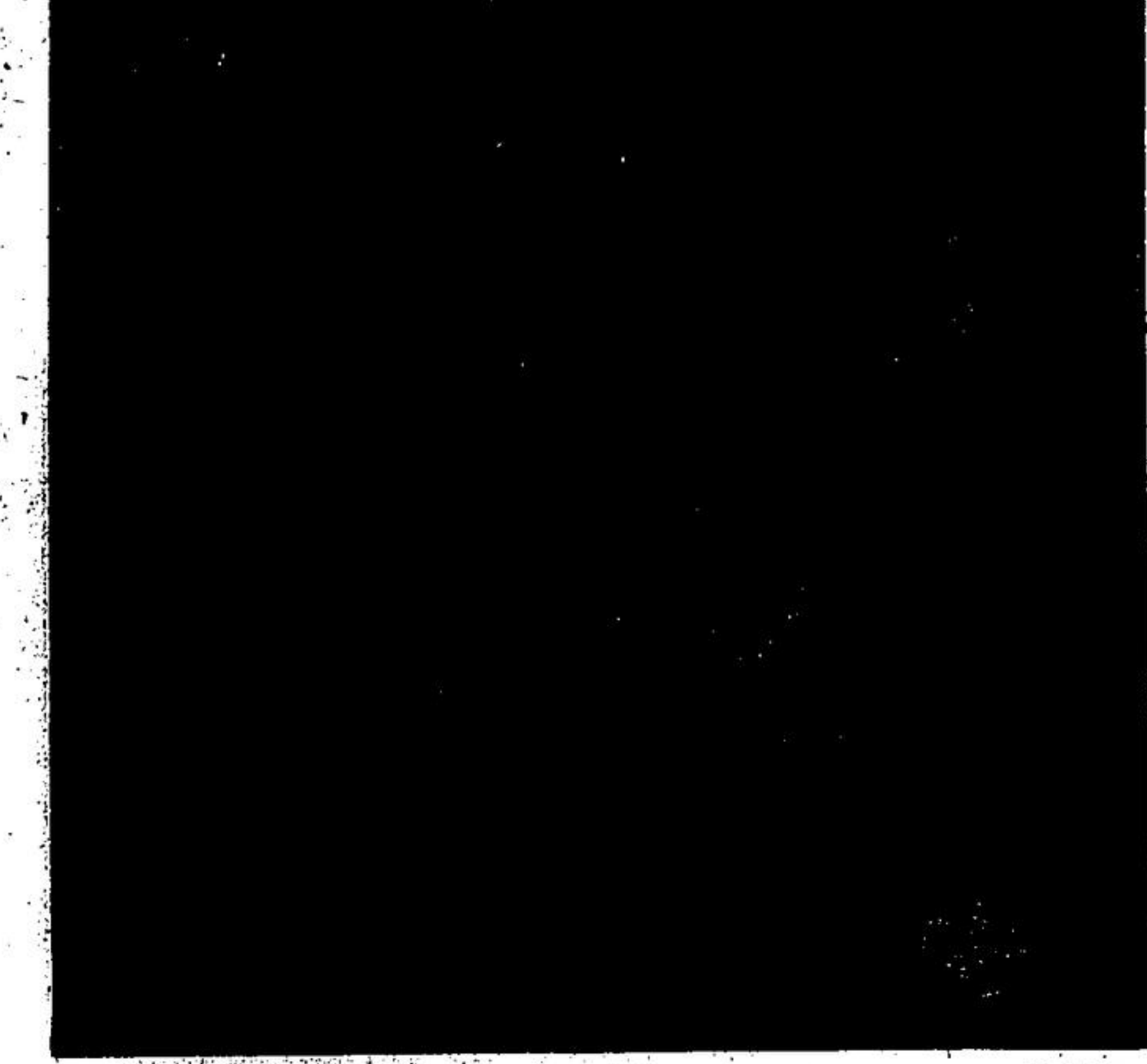
GIRL GUIDE NEWS
