Just a few random items of news: Exhibits of old treasures at Acton Parish Church will range from parish registers since registers were ordered to be kept (1538) and a recently restored brass dated 1558, to tapestry covers for the eleyr stalls and Lady Chapel, now being worked by the ladies of the church; and from the famous gold plate given by Duchess Dudley in 1640 and hidden in water-cress beds during the visits of the Cromwells, to the pewter tankard, inscribed Acton Parish Church, and the vestry minute book by which it appears that every meeting "adjourned to the George" (18th Century).
