The secretary read the report of the last meeting and financial report. Mrs. Frank Brown and Mrs. James Noble were chosen as delegates to the Toronto area convention.

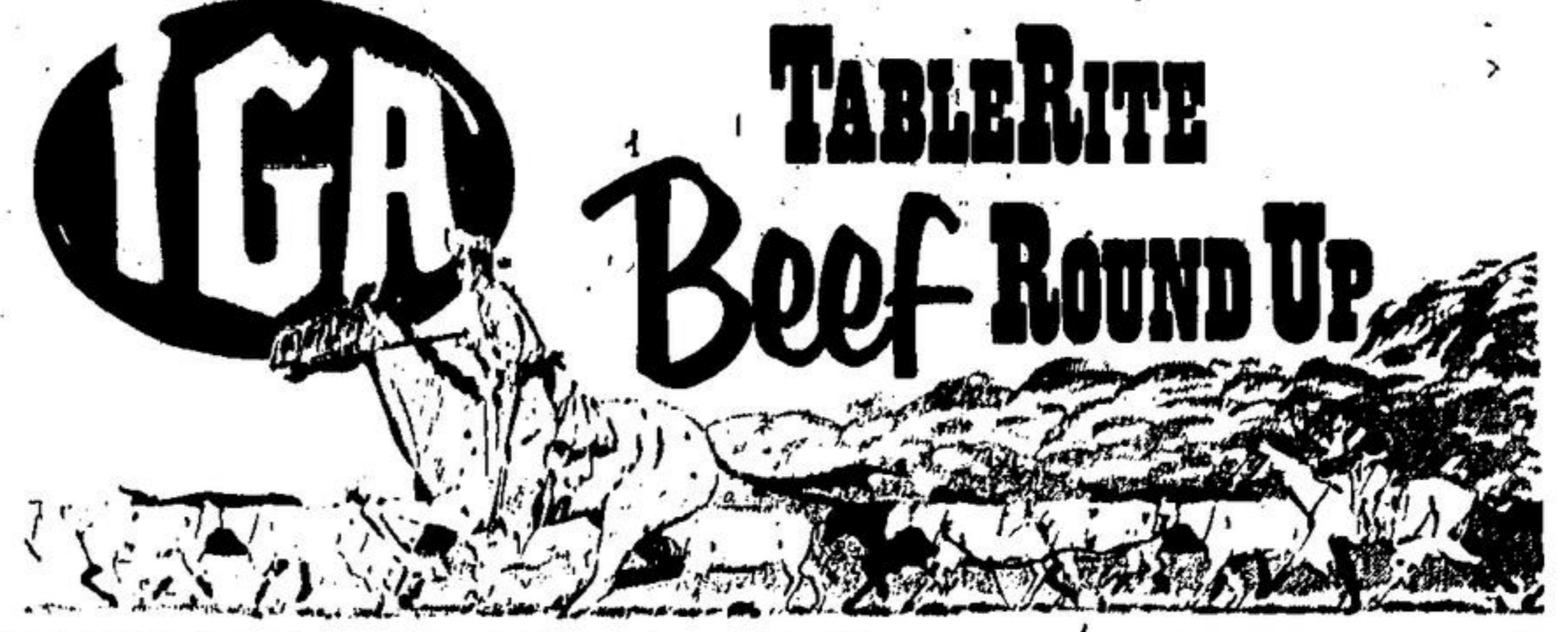
The motion, "World Affairs are our affairs" was well prepared and read by Mrs. A. W. Houston.
