

Sister Church Co-operates

Knox Congregation Adopts \$23,000 Budget; Visitation Plan Outlined

At a well attended meeting on Tuesday evening, the congregation of Knox Presbyterian church unanimously adopted the proposed 1960 program which had previously been developed on the basis of a survey of needs of all organizations and approved by the 15-man Board of Managers.

This program anticipates total offerings in the amount of \$23,000, which figure represents an approximate increase of 15 per cent. over the anticipated total receipts of 1959. "This figure was set by the Board," stated its chairman, James Greer, in reporting to the congregation, "in the belief that it is attainable because of the increase in membership, and because of a deepening awareness among the people of the church of their stewardship responsibilities."

Deacons Register

The business meeting followed a delicious dessert - supper served to those present by a group of ladies from St. Alban's Anglican church,

of which Mrs. T. H. Cochran was the hostess. Other members of the Anglican church were also entertaining children of the Knox congregation with films and food while the business meeting was being held in Knox church.

This instance of co-operation between the two sister communions will be repeated this evening (Thursday) when the St. Alban's parish hold their business meeting for the consideration of their 1960 program.

The meeting itself was chaired by Stanley Norton, program chairman, and other chairmen took part. Scripture was read by Miss Inez McLellan, materials chairman, and Mac Sprawl, resources chairman, invoked the blessing of God on the meeting in prayer and later presented graphic "blown up" samples of commitment cards and envelopes, explaining their use and urging the support of the three funds, current, budget and building fund.

The general chairman of the Every Person Visitation, James Greer, outlined the development of the plan of advance in the congregation as encouraged by the sector plan of the Canadian Council of Churches.

Walter McEachern, visitations chairman, gave a brief address on the recruitment and training of visitors for visiting in the homes of members and adherents on Stewardship Sunday afternoon, November 15, and asked for an increase in the number presently offering their services in this important task.

Compliments Congregation

The thrilling story of the accomplishments of the extension fund of the corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston was given in a 15 minute address by the Rev. David McCullough of Toronto. Mr. McCullough, who heads the seven-man Board of Directors which includes James Stewart, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, noted that in the first year of the Synod Extension Fund's operations, \$802,000 had been made available to seven new congregations in the Synod for the building of new churches.

One of these new churches is Westminster - St. Paul's church, now being erected on Victoria Road on the eastern outskirts of Guelph. Mr. McCullough complimented the Knox congregation in their decision of a few months ago to contribute \$3,225 in the next five years to the capital reserve fund of the corporation.

Miss Lily McArthur, Dean of The Presbyterian Missionary and Deaconess School, effectively presented the plans now moving rapidly towards fruition for a new school on the same site as the old school on St. George Street, Toronto. She indicated that this school will include a chapel, a library, two classrooms and a seminar room as well as enlarged dormitory space to take care of the anticipated increase in enrollment of women students for the full-time service of the church.

She also indicated her great pleasure in knowing that Knox church has committed itself to providing \$300 for the building fund of the new school.

Facilities Needed

Speaking briefly about the building fund of Knox church, R. Parker noted that the need for the rapid accumulation of a substantial sum of money for a new Christian Education building is urgent. The church school and organizations of children and young people are steadily increasing in size and these will be hampered in their total effectiveness unless suitable facilities and equipment are provided.

Mr. Parker said that the congregation should be delighted with the progress already made in the first ten months of this year in establishing a building fund. The fund stands at approximately \$3,900.

At the conclusion of the meeting the minister, the Rev. A. H. McKenzie, urged the congregation to support the 1960 program out of a grateful awareness of God's manifold goodness to us, and stated that his earnest hope was that his own long experience in directing Every Person Visitation might be used to the fullest degree, for the glory of God.
