

Bishop Confirms Largest Class in Parish History

St. Alban's church and adjoining Luxton Memorial Hall were both crowded Sunday evening when the Rt. Rev. W. E. Bagnall, D.D., D.C.L., Bishop of Niagara, confirmed 40 candidates forming the largest class in the history of the parish.

At the beginning of the ancient and impressive ceremony, Rev. H. B. Siskroff presented his candidates for the Laying on of Hands. Rev. Donald West of Flora officiated as Bishop's Chaplain. The Crucifier was Rev. Harold Thomason of St. Luke's church, Hamilton.

In his address to the newly confirmed, Bishop Bagnall said the rite of confirmation might be described as ordination "to the royal priesthood of Christ." It signified God's blessing and commission to His work.

The Laying on of Hands was a very old custom practiced long before the Church of Christ was formed. In this manner, ancient patriarchs gave their blessing. "You have not chosen to take this step. God has chosen you. This is your response to God," Bishop Bagnall declared.

The Rev. H. C. Linstead, M.A., D.D., of Westmoreland United Church was in charge of the service.

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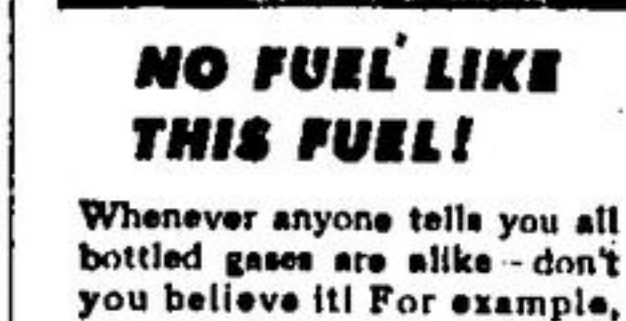
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
