## Donors Swell Blood Bank Supply During Annual Clinic in Acton

The appeal was sent out and 243 people responded — as a result 324 pints of whole blood were transported from the blood clinic held in the Legion auditorium last Thursday to the blood bank in Hamilton.

Twelve nurses including assistants, equipped with 22 hospital beds, stacks of empty bottles for blood and three mobile units, were kept busy from 2 p.m. in the afternoon until after 9 p.m. in the evening.

Even while beds were being dismantled and packed away in the mobile unit, last minute donors were being taken on the remaining equipment. None were turned away as Mrs. Irene Costie, in charge of the clinic, related the blood is much needed and every pint helps out.

The canvass for donors in Acton this year was under the supervision of Vic Patrick, past president of Acton Legion. His team of canvassers blitzed the town the week previous in an attempt to procure sufficient donors to make the clinic worthwhile.

### Needed More Equipment

Mr. Patrick stated the response to the canvass was so gratifying the Red Cross Unit in Hamilton was notified to bring additional equipment and help.

Shortly after arriving in Acton, the team of Red Cross workers was busily engaged in unloading the vehicles, setting up hospital beds, stacking empty bottles for blood, preparing solutions for blood tests and then donning uniforms in preparation for the start of the clinic.

The first donors began to arrive within minutes of their designated appointment and the nurses and volunteers went into action as one donor a minute was put through the process of donating blood.

No one was rushed — everyone took their time. From the time donors entered the auditorium someone was at their side telling them what to do next.

### Get Information

After registering, the prospective donor received a drink of juice and a blood test to determine the type. Then further information for record purposes was typed on a master sheet for future reference.

After being typed and receiving

the administrator expressed his regret. He noted that it is impossible to accept everyone as some may be eliminated due to a recent illness or certain past sicknesses.

Shortly after the blood was taken from the donors, it was stored in a refrigerator truck standing by, and after the clinic closed, it was transported to the important blood bank in Hamilton where the much-needed blood is stored.

The administrator expressed his thanks to the Legion for acting as co-sponsors for the clinic, commended the volunteer help which made it possible to stage a successful clinic.

"Without donors and without the assistance of organizations, it is impossible for us to carry out a

successful clinic," Mr. Batten explained. The administrator pointed out that not only was the work of the nurses, technicians, drivers and other assistants from the Red Cross important, but stressed the importance of volunteer help in registration, setting up equipment, providing and serving lunch and the many other important jobs entailed in holding a clinic.

The following staff was present from the Red Cross Unit in Hamilton and worked throughout the day under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Costie, with Mrs. Doreen Starr second in charge, nurses aides, Miss Sharon McDonald, Miss Kay Farley, Mrs. V. Landers, Miss Dorothy Thompson, Mrs. Lois Bachman, Miss Rita Robartelle and Miss Corrie Vander Lee, head technician.

Drivers were Mrs. Eileen Farnan, Miss Winifred De Maura and Mrs. Doris Billbrough.

Mrs. William Enslay of Acton had charge of volunteer assistance for registration and volunteer nurses to assist the Red Cross. The following ladies worked under her supervision:

Because of the success of the blood clinic in Acton last Thursday, persons in need of blood transfusions will be able to obtain blood free of charge. In past years before this service was adopted, anyone in need of a blood transfusion was required to pay a fee or provide donors to replace the amount of blood used.

Once again the citizens of Acton have answered the call for blood, thus giving someone a chance for survival they might not otherwise have had.
