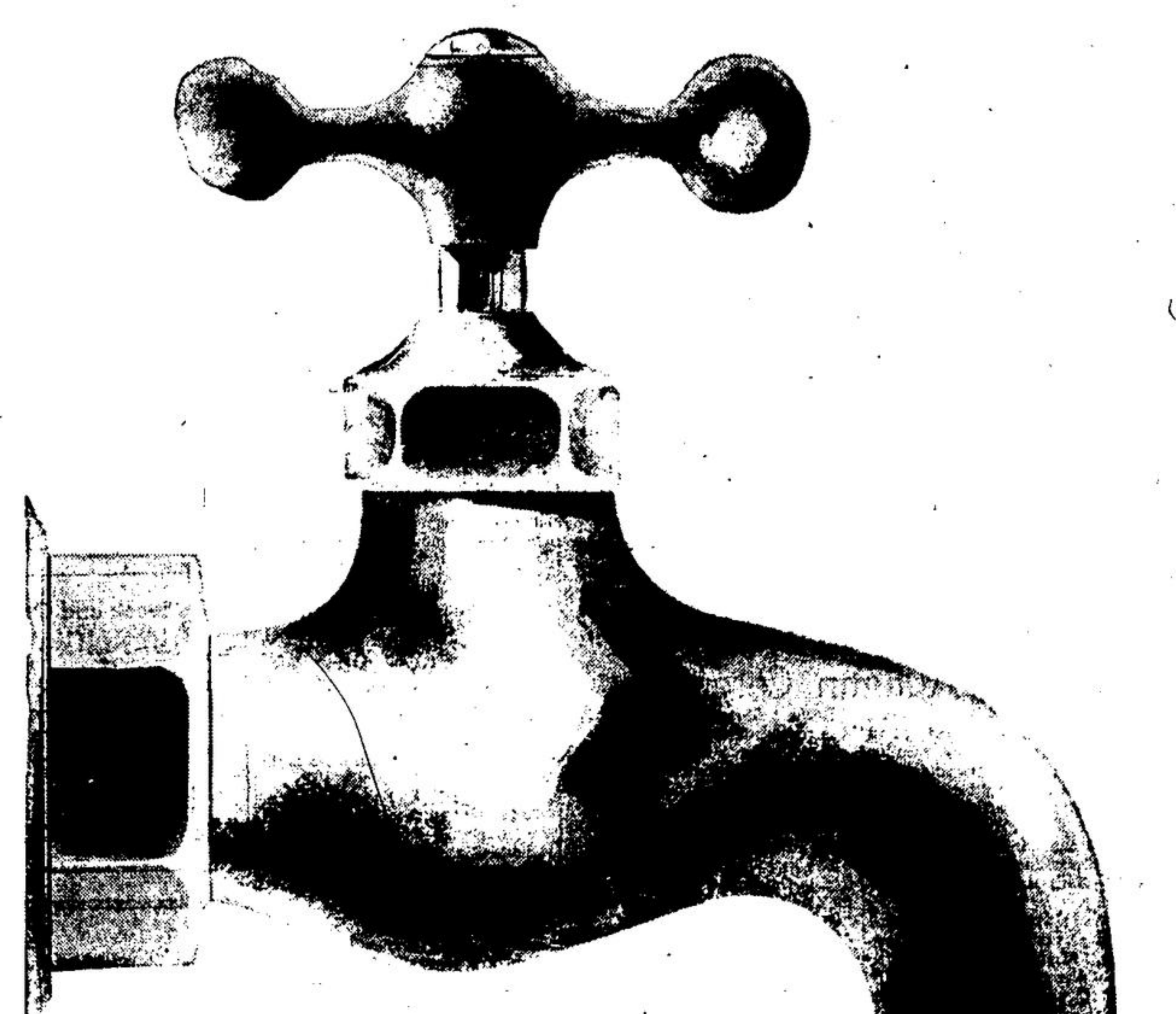
She leaves in mourn her late stepson Theodore with whom she
