A questionnaire for radio and TV survey was filled in by those present.

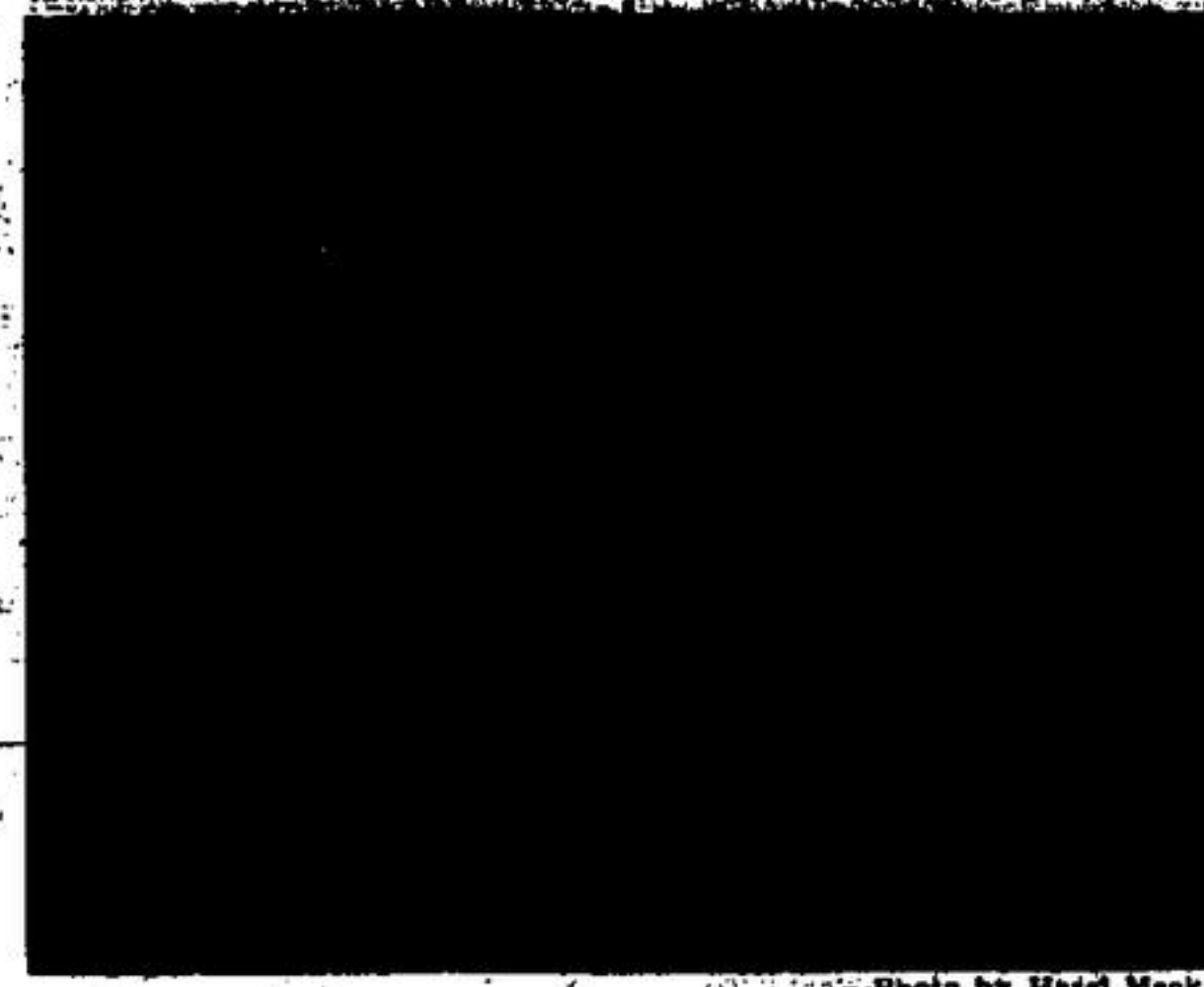
Six more card tables are being purchased for the euchre.

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RUSSIAN POULTRY experts made an inspection of the Lloyd Thomas farm in Eramosa township on Monday. Their interpreter and Canadian officials came along to see one of the largest poultry operations in Ontario.

Four Serious Russian Experts Inspect Eramosa Poultry Farm

Four keenly interested Russian poultry experts with their interpreter and a number of Canadian officials in the poultry division visited the farm of Lloyd Thomas on Monday for an inspection tour.

They are guests of Robert Gray of Galt and were interested in the Thomas farm on the fifth line of Eramosa township, just above Rockwood because it is one of the larger poultry operations in Ontario.

They were taken through the poultry building by Mr. Thomas though they were not permitted to enter any of the pens. This was a precaution against disease as the visitors had been to a number of other farms previously.

Many Questions
Their interpreter, H. W. Trevor, Dept. of Economics, Ottawa, was busy constantly asking questions.

Visiting Dignitaries
The four Russians were M. Bagdanov, chief poultry officer, minister of Agriculture, Soviet Union, Moscow; V. Valkov, chief poultry officer, Russian Republic; N. Daeh, novskij, director Ukrainian research institute and V. Vasiljiv, operator of collective state farms with 30,000 breeders and a total of 230,000 birds.

With the party were J. A. Morrison, district inspector, poultry marketing, provincial services; E. D. Bonyman, assistant chief, poultry division, Ottawa and C. M. Harvey, district provincial supervisor for Ontario.

Mr. Harvey was some years ago, an R.O.P. man and worked in the Rockwood area. Lloyd Thomas recognized him at once and now Mr. Harvey is planning to return to the village and renew his acquaintanceship with both Lloyd and his father.
