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Hints on Venison

How to Handle, Cook Roasts

Thousands of Ontario hunters will cut up pieces about three inches thick for roasts each fall and this year will be no exception. In thick cuts the meat is heated and a delicious sensation of sugar is caused to melt but not burn. Two fat strips of butter are added or some of the animal fat may be used. When it is smoking add the meat and turn until it is well browned.

Remove the roasting pot and cover with tinfoil or cold water. Put a stick with four onions through the six carrots. Add these with a sprig of chopped rosemary leaves and add to the stew. Let all simmer gently for three hours or more with the oven well covered.

No Flour Needed — A roasting stick is inserted from time to time. When it has cooked the meat, add two cups of dry bread crumbs and a white shoulder length veil. Youngster's Old Cradle Thrilling Antique Find

Every so often, antique lovers find a worthwhile treasure from the past. George Smith, R.R. 3, Rockwood, came home from a sale recently with what seemed to be a mangle long past its usefulness.

Mr. Smith found it at a local auction sale and luckily recognized a valuable and interesting piece of furniture beneath many layers of peeling paint and dirt.

Of exquisite design, it is made of cherry wood with oak rockers. It was found in the barn on the farm formerly owned by John Laughlin. A previous owner was Wilbert Mokumar who lived for many years on the farm that is now the Indian Trail.

Storied Past

Entirely so far has not revealed the original owners of the cradle. It seems likely however that it was stored a good number of years where it was found.

It could be that the cradle belonged to the McLaughlin family who also owned the farm many years ago. There is the remote possibility that it came on the farm through marriage belonging to either the family of Mrs. McLaughlin or Mrs. Dominic McLaughlin whose family name was White.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith had the cradle refurbished and it probably looks exactly as it did when new, so beautifully has it been done.

Thrilling "Find"

Truly, the eight-month-old daughter of the Smiths now uses the cradle. All who see it are delighted. It is logical to think that one of the early distinct custom makers made it. Yet in design it is quite different from the customary spool type, common in pioneer days.

Wherever it came from, it is a real treasure. It makes the search for antiques thrilling. Such a "find" is a rich reward for waiting sometimes hours while the antiques gets around to the stuff often termed as junk.
