Increased Bible Sales Noted by Rev. B. Walden

Interest in the Bible has increased in many parts of the world.

Rev. B. L. Walden of Brampton held a gathering in the Christian Reformed church Sunday evening representing area D of the Upper Canada Bible Society. He was the guest speaker at a series of worship and meeting sponsored by the Action branch and attended by ministers and members of local congregations.

Having his message on the Old Testament text, "Whom shall we send?" Mr. Walden reviewed the contributions made by Upper Canada Bible Society and British and Foreign Bible Society in translating and distributing the Holy Book throughout the world.

As examples of increasing interest in other countries the area representative noted the sale of Bibles in Poland jumped from 25,000 to 240,000. From Japan with half a million nominal Christians comes reports that one and a half billion copies have been sold.

Although officials cannot wholly account for the trend, increased literacy probably accounts for part of the mounting demand. Mr. Walden suggested Canada, he said, makes the second largest contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society 21 per cent of the amount

realized was spent in producing the Bible in 36 languages.

Show Film

To illustrate Bible Society ministry work Mr. Walden showed a film depicting its activities in New Guinea. He was introduced by Rev. Gordon Adams of Action United church.
