## Eventually All County T.B. Tests for H. S. Teachers, Students

High school teachers and students in the Oakville - Trafalgar area are to be tuberculin-tested in the early part of the new year. The tests will be carried out at T. A. Blacklock high school and Oakville-Trafalgar high school by the health unit staff and the health education consultant of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association, working in the area.

**Determines Contact**  
The tuberculin test is a simple procedure to determine which students or teachers have been affected at any time by contact with tuberculous germs. "By the time many persons reach adulthood," explains Dr. Bull, "they have been affected with tuberculosis without any apparent ill effects."

**Better Facilities**  
The Oakville - Trafalgar area was chosen as the starting point, according to Dr. Bull, because its X-ray facilities for the follow-up of positive reactors are more adequate at the present time.

**X-ray Positives**  
"The high school students reacting positively in this project will be X-rayed," said Dr. Bull, "and the members of the household where a positive student resides will also be tested. If a high school student is found with active tuberculosis, then in all likelihood he will have been discovered at a very early stage of the disease, when treatment is easiest and most successful," he said.

**Set Up Schedule**  
"In addition," he said, "association members have offered to assist in setting up the schedule within the schools as well as with the processing of record forms to be used in the project." The association spokesman stated that they have agreed also to pay for the cost of any additional professional assistance required by the health unit personnel in carrying out the project.

**Sign Consent**  
Before the tests, however, students will be given consent forms to be signed by parents or guardians. Included with the consent forms will be printed information describing the test, its benefits and safety, and the significance of the results. Advance visits to the schools will be made by the public health nurses under the direction of Miss G. J. Leavay, supervisor of nursing for the Halton County Health Unit.

### Those Giants Aren't All Gone

Many a lumbering story speaks of the huge majestic trees that used to stand in the forests of Southern Ontario. Some were said to be even large enough to defy the efforts of Paul Bunyan and his Blue Ox to log and move them to the sawmill.

These giants are said to be long since gone from our land but at least one still remains.

A. B. Samells, retired zone foreman with the Department of Lands and Forests in Bruce County, came across a White Elm standing on the banks of the Sauble River. This tree may well be the largest of its species still remaining in the province.

Together with zone forester J. A. Fingland, Mr. Samells obtained the following measurements: circumference at three feet above the ground, 24 ft. 9 in.; circumference at 4.5 feet above the ground, 20 ft. 2 in.; circumference at eight feet above the ground, 18 ft. 7 in.; diameter at breast height, 7 in. or 6 ft. 5 in.; crown spread, 85 ft.; total height, 135 ft.

● Approving Reeve J. H. Goy to act on behalf of the mayor during the mayor's absence.

● Authorizing the mayor and treasurer to advance money requisitioned by the Acton public and high school boards for 1960.

● Authorizing the mayor and clerk to sign cheques and look after the financial dealings with the banks.

● Authorizing the mayor and treasurer to pay the weekly salaries of salaried employees as well as wages of all town employees.

● Approving a by-law to borrow up to the amount of \$150,000 to meet current expenses for the year.

● Ordering a letter filed from J. J. Stewart former chairman of the P.U.C.

John D. Ladouceur who started his employment with the town as assessor was present at the inaugural meeting to meet the 1960 council.
