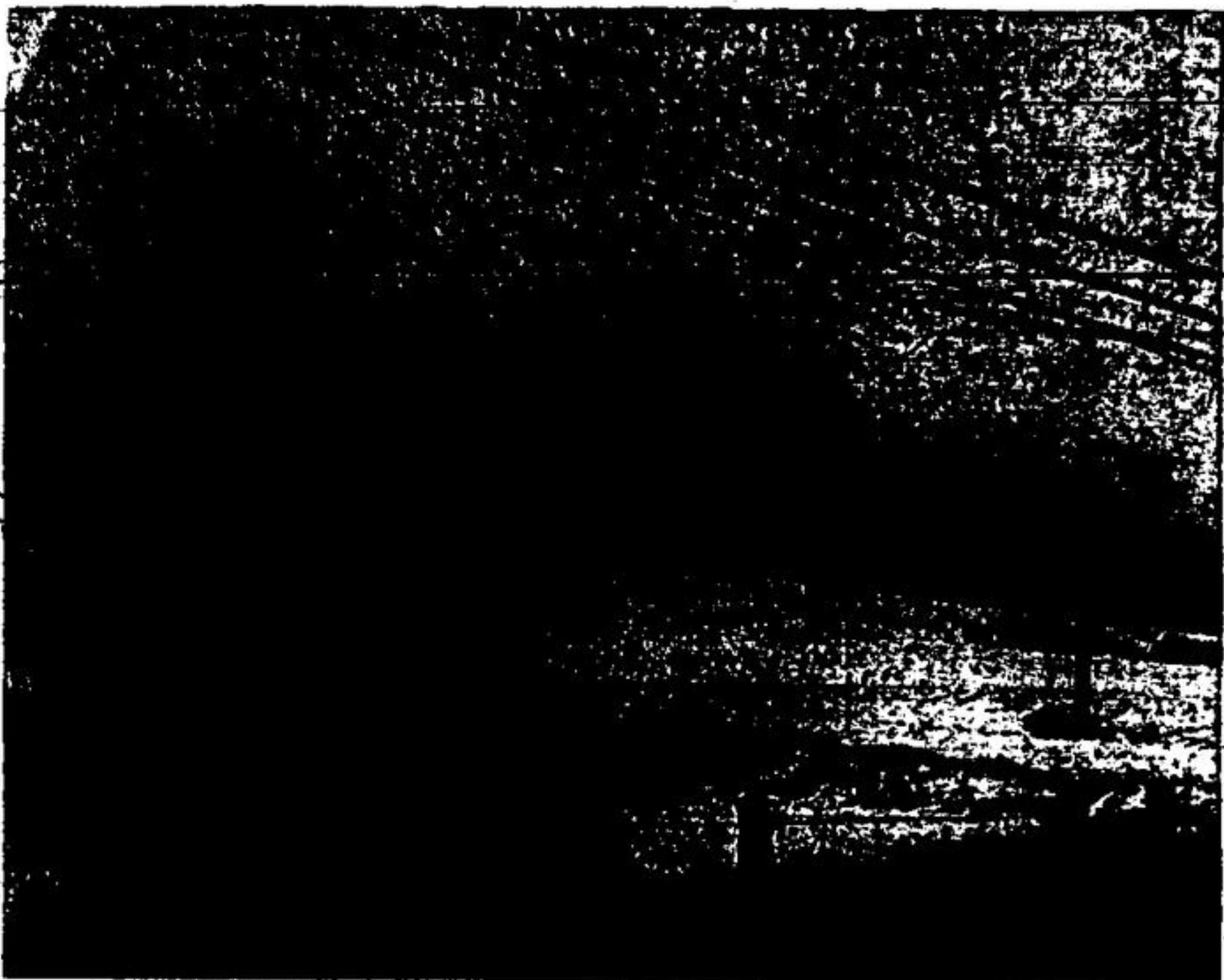
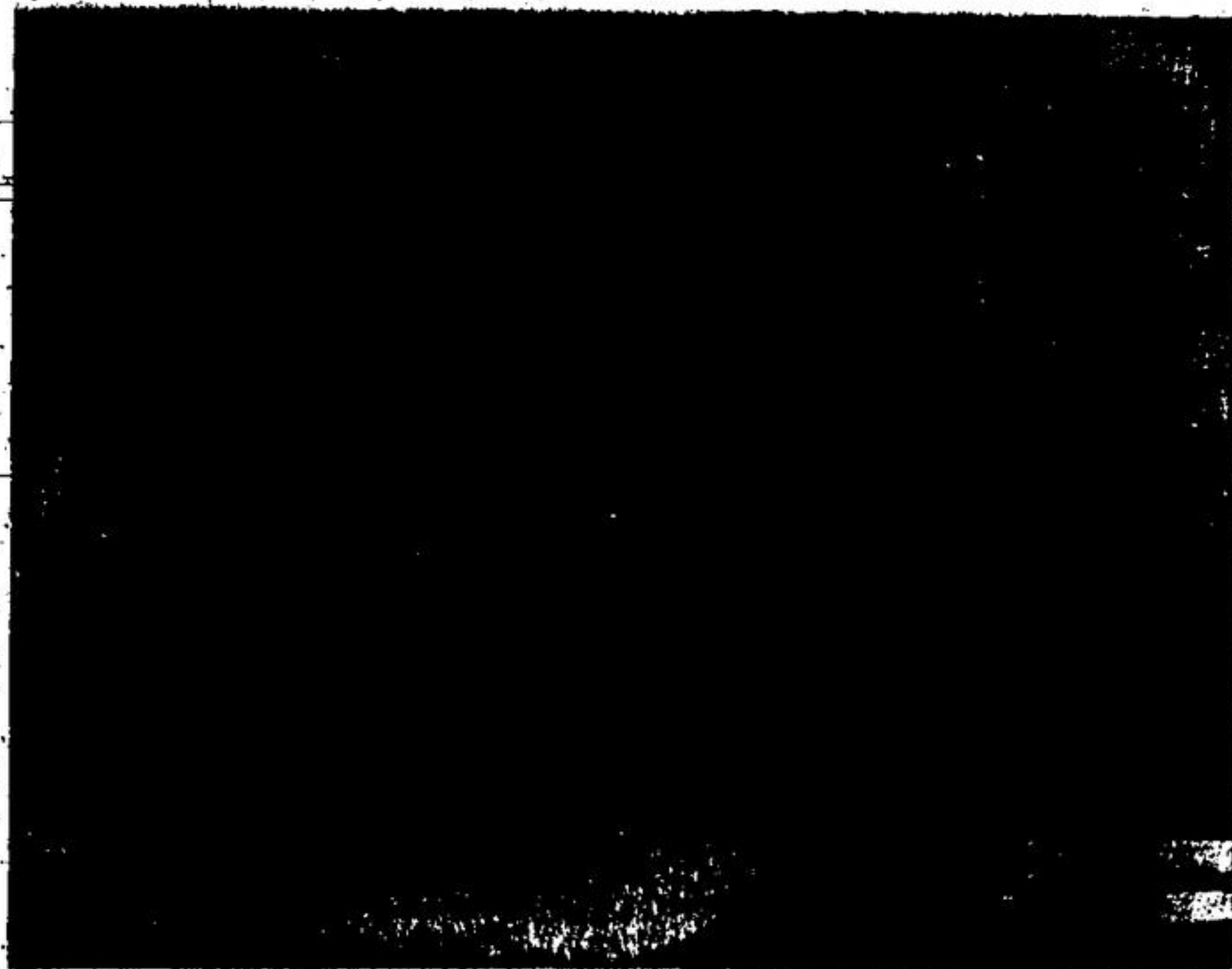
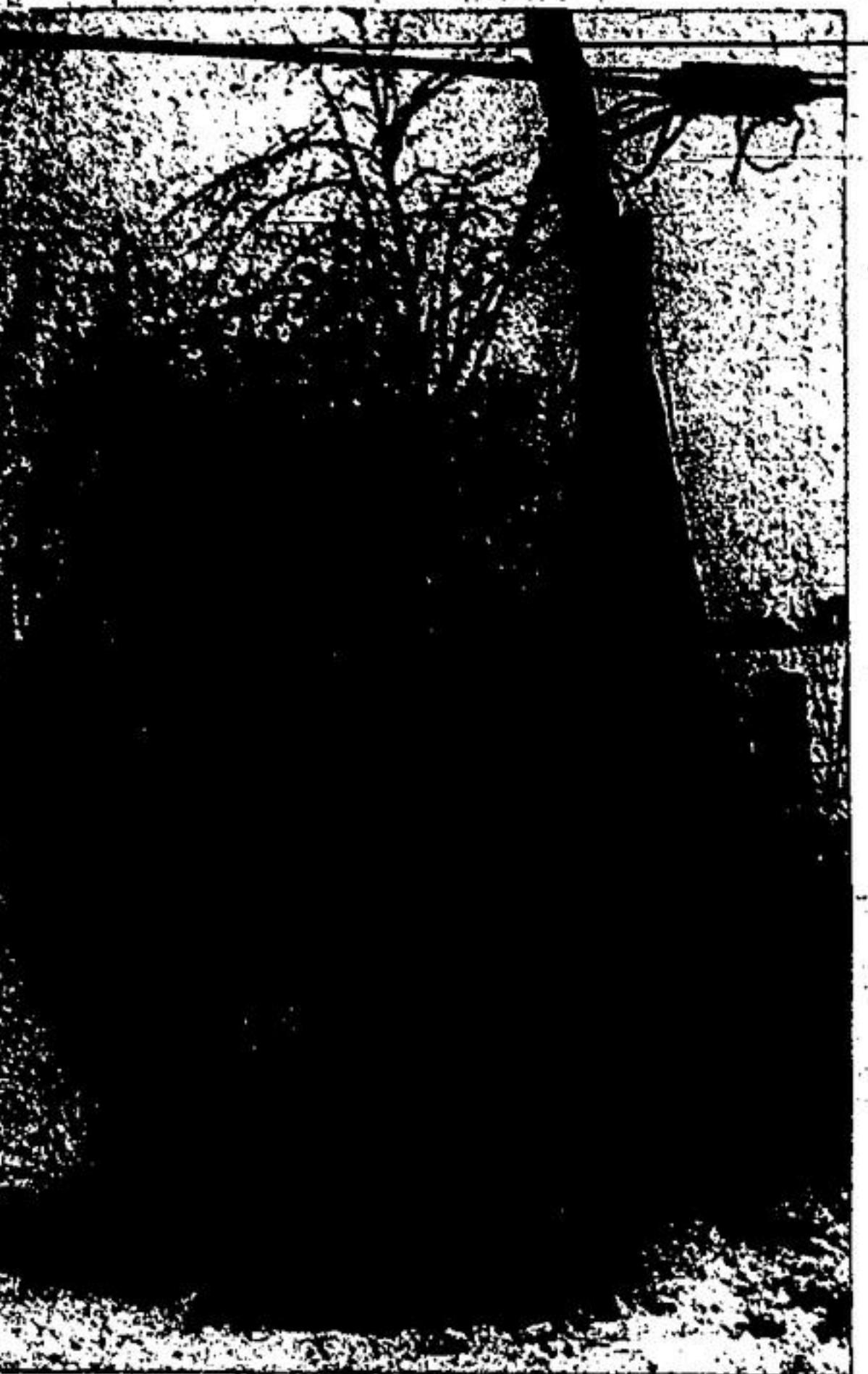
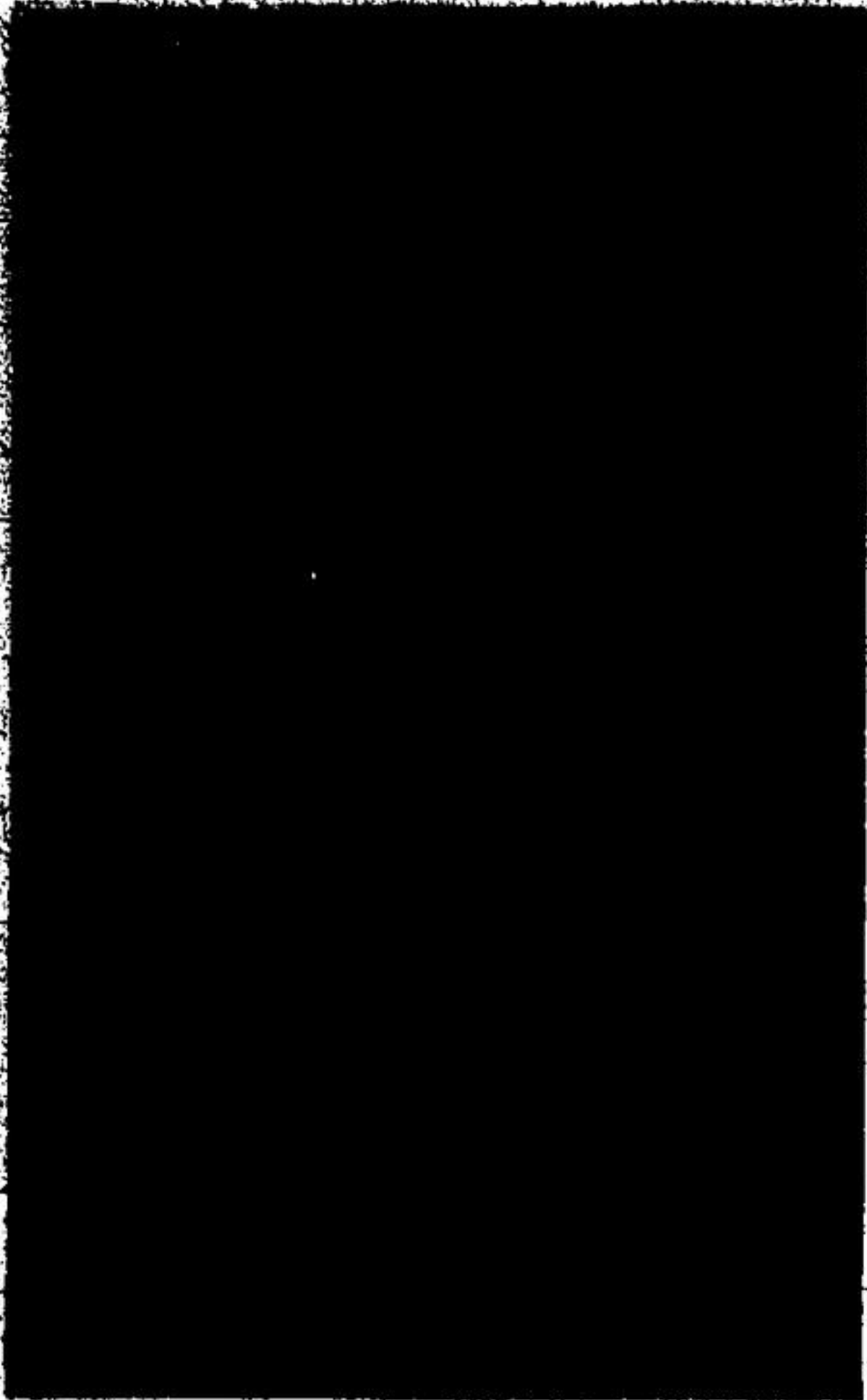


Ice Storm Leaves Picturesque Scenery in Acton and District

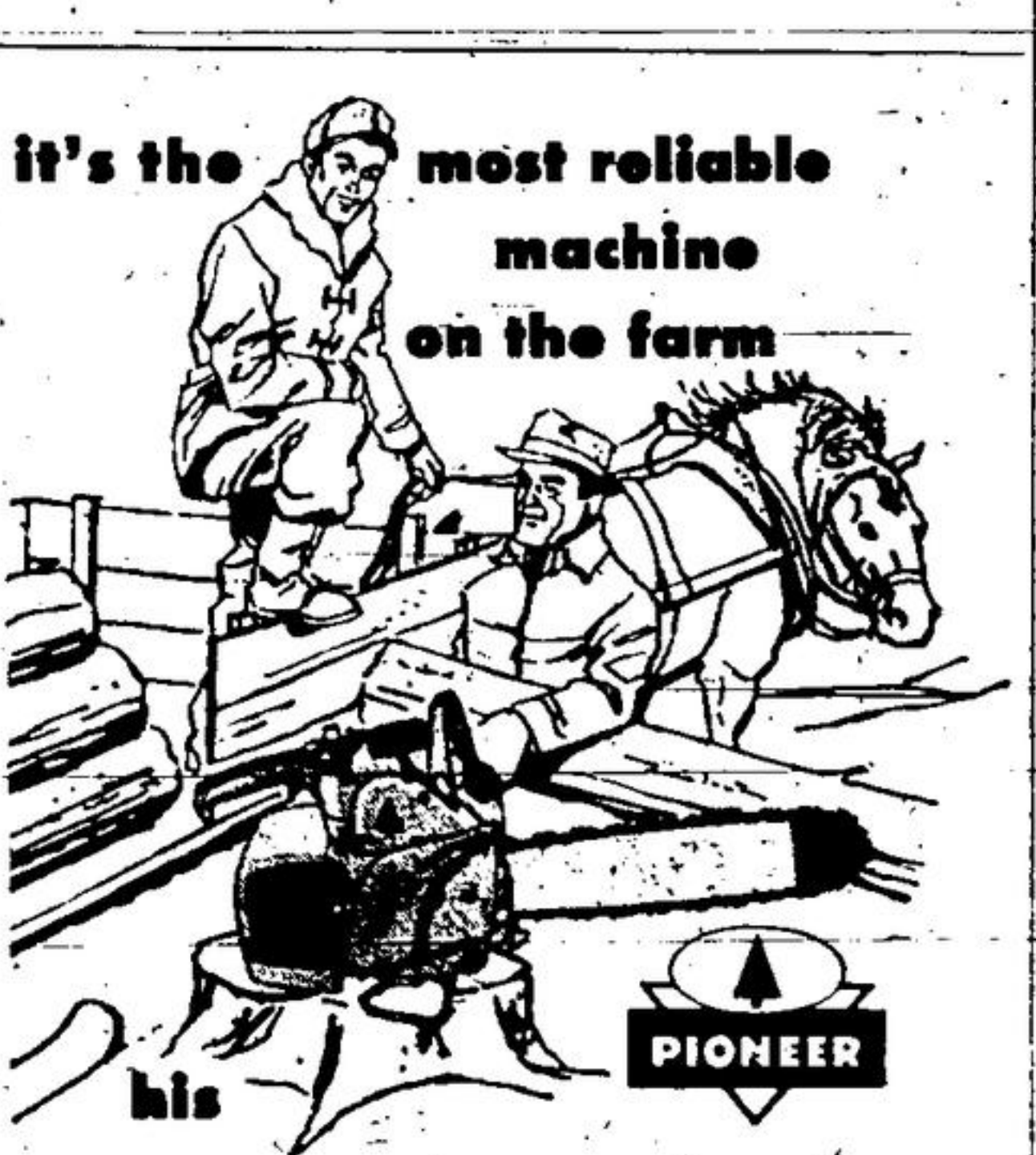
WHAT'S MY LANE

8. Don't let children play hockey or other winter games on or near the street.
