Wolfe Jersey Class Leader

In the list of Canadian class leaders in the Jersey breed for 1959, 15 of the 66 classes are led by cattle which were all bred by B. H. Bull and Son, Brampton, Ont.

Brampton Winnie Radar, developed at Brampton, and now owned by J. W. Wolfe of Acton, is the high senior four-year old cow, three years milking with 1,289 lbs. of milk and 609 lbs. of fat. She is also a leader in the butterfat division.

One of the outstanding cows is the famous producer, Brampton W.R. Luan Pini, who ends up the year by leading four classes in the 12 years and over division, on two times milking, both for 305 days and 365 days. In 305 days, Luan Pini produced 15,286 lbs. of milk and 800 lbs. of fat. In 365 days she produced 17,381 lbs. of milk and 833 lbs. of fat. These are the highest butterfat and milk records made by a Jersey cow in Canada last year.
