—Acton's streets took on a new appearance on Wednesday morning after the town workmen labored through the night widening the streets by pushing back the snow banks and removing snow.

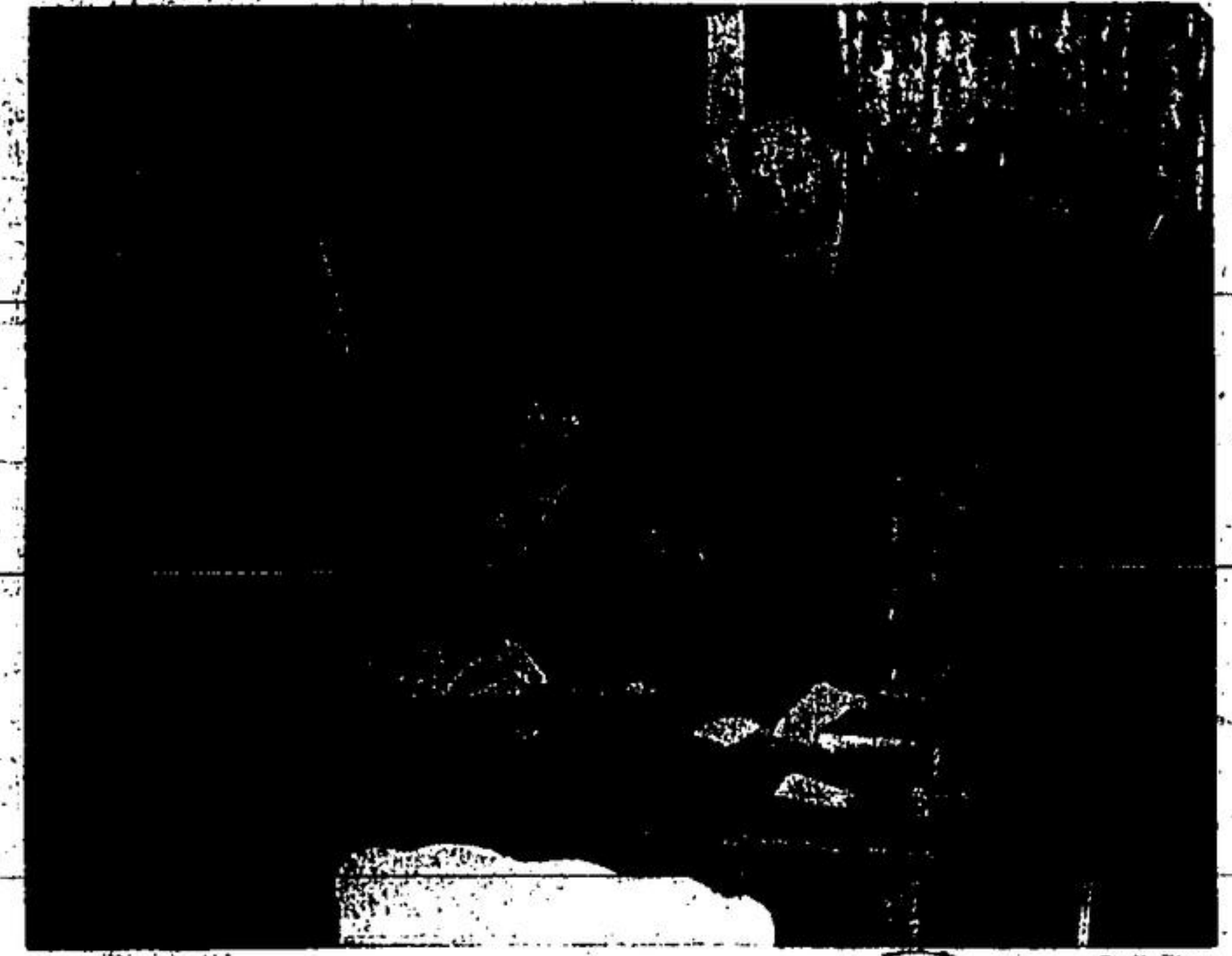
Club Hears Guest Explain Industry
