**Guest Speaker**  
Principal E. A. Hansen introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. J. E. Houck of Brampton, who had been Canada's only woman delegate to the United Nations Assembly, Mrs. Houck had also been connected with Brampton high school for 12 years, and was a member of a Royal Commission.

In congratulating the staff and pupils on their wonderful building and expressing her delight in being able to talk to the young people, she informed the parents they had a great stake in the future of Canada but emphasized the young people had an even greater stake and stressed the importance of not looking back but ahead.

Mrs. Houck explained her duties connected with the United Nations General Assembly and recounted many of her personal experiences with foreign representatives.

The guest speaker noted there were 600 people representing different nations at the assembly. Each one had a kindly feeling toward Canada.

She finally told the students not to get the idea because they were from Canada that they were any better or smarter than people from other countries. She cited cases where other countries were leading in certain fields.

**Try to Raise Standard**  
Mrs. Houck told the audience that over 5000 U.N. employees standard of living in many were attempting to raise the standards of living in many countries. More than 70 per cent of the people of the world can not read or write.

The speaker noted that too many young people thought their lessons were too hard to learn but stated that throughout the world a number of people would give anything to take their place.

"We are too smart and self-satisfied on the North American continent to realize that 89 per cent of the world goes to bed hungry," stated Mrs. Houck.

In conclusion, the speaker informed the students their future can be what they make it and added, "As a coming generation, you have the opportunity to show charity and kindness and be of use to the rest of the world."

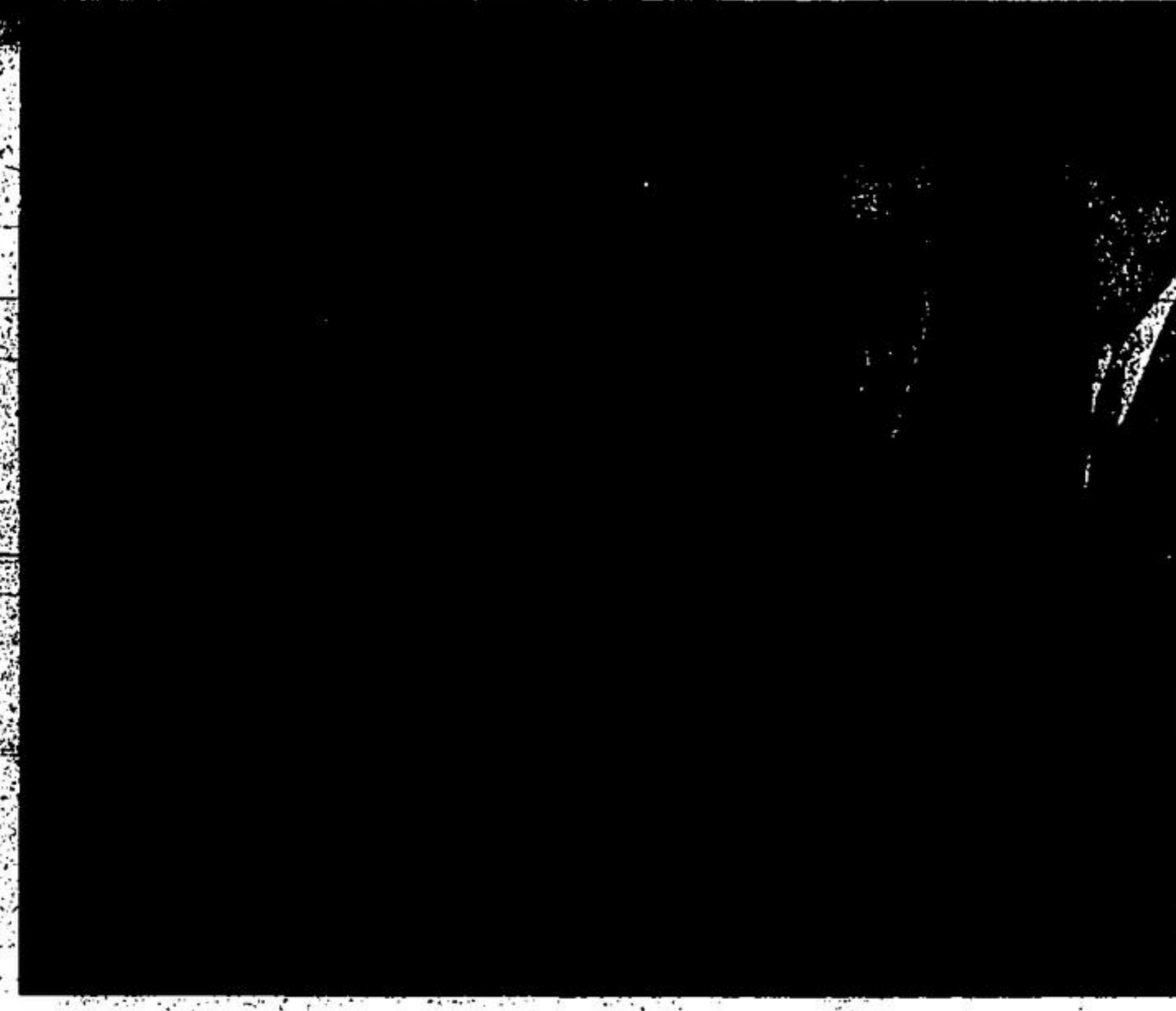
