Over 200 Toast Immortal Bard At Annual Burns' Night Dinner

SCOTS like toasts to every corner of the world. He spoke of the influence in Burns' life and the influence they exerted on his writings.

In a humorous reply to the toast to the lassies, Herb Saravanamuttu, future son-in-law of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Buckner, delighted listeners with reminiscences of the Scotland he knew.

Two members of the Guelph Light Opera Company, Mrs. Helen Brown and Jas. MacLaughlin sang well known Scottish musical numbers, accompanied by Mrs. Kathleen Diggles on the piano.

Highlight of the evening, the toast to the immortal memory of Robert Burns, was proposed by Rev. Paul Stirling, chaplain of every highland regiment except the Black Watch. Mr. Stirling is now minister of St. Andrew's church, Toronto. He was introduced by Dr. Robert Buckner, president of the Acton Scottish Dance Club.

Robert Burns came at a time when Scotland needed him most, said Mr. Stirling. National identity was at its lowest ebb, in danger of being swallowed up by its large and ambitious neighbor to the south.

The speaker noted when Burns' writings appeared, they acted like a beacon to the Scottish people. They took a new outlook on life and preserved their identity.

Scotland was richer for Robert Burns, Mr. Stirling continued. The world is richer because his influence went far and wide with the words of Scots from their own shores.

The dignified minister said he couldn't agree with those who whitewash Burns. Nor could he find any sympathy with Burns' detractors.

"Robert Burns was somewhere in between," he told his audience. He was a product of his times when morals were often dictated by economic necessity.

Baptist Achievement 50 Per Cent of Members Attend Annual Meeting

Following a pot luck supper, the annual meeting of the Acton Baptist church was held on the evening of January 20, with Rev. Gordon Holmes, pastor of the church, presiding. Charles Landborough, for many years clerk of the church, was acting in his usual capacity.

The pastor's report stressed the goodness of God towards the church during the past year and urged upon the members the consecration of themselves to prosecute vigorously the task entrusted to them in this town and community.

The report of the clerk showed a gain of 10 members. There had been 10 baptisms by immersion during the year, three had joined by letter, three our Christian experience, while two had transferred from the membership by letter and four names had been dropped. Of the present membership of 62, 54 were resident, eight non-resident. The church had increased in membership during the year by nearly 20 per cent.

Loyal McCutcheon reported for the deacons and Lloyd Bulmer for the Sunday School. As superintendent, Mr. Bulmer indicated the average attendance at the school had increased from 38 in 1957 to 48 in 1959 and that the objective for 1960 was 75.

Mrs. Nora Dunk reported for the Cradle Roll, Mrs. Norma Baillie for the Explorers, Miss Janice Robinson, the president, the Baptist Hi-Fellowship and John Chapman for the Adult Fellowship. Mrs. John Chapman reported for the Mission "Circle" with a membership of 26 and an average attendance of 22. Almost every woman in the church is a member of the Mission Circle, which is directed by Mrs. Charles Landborough.

The trustees under Mrs. Helwig reported the total loan from the Home Mission Board on the parsonage as \$2,400, to be retired in 10 annual instalments, interest at two per cent.

Beginning in 1959, the Canadian Baptist, the denominational paper, was put in the budget and sent to every home in the church, reported Mrs. Mabel Hutchison. Mrs. John Chapman presented the financial report which showed

for the general fund of the church, receipts of \$4,606, and expenditures of \$4,264. In addition the special rehabilitation fund directed by Mr. Bulmer and opened in 1957 had retired the last of the loan of \$4,700—a very gratifying result.

Total receipts were \$10,731, and disbursements, \$10,669, for the year 1959. Mr. Bulmer later commented that the report in 1956 showed receipts of \$2,200 in the general offering as against \$4,606 in 1959.

Miss Elda Fryer reported for the Mission Fund of the church, showing receipts of \$872, against a suggested quota of \$750, which compares with \$264, in 1957 and \$378, in 1958.

The church adopted the budget presented by Mr. Bulmer for 1960—showing for general expenses an anticipated outlay of \$3,912, and for capital expenditures an added \$1,500, to provide better facilities in the basement.

50% Attend
It was very gratifying that over 50 per cent of the membership was present—an unusually high percentage for any annual church meeting anywhere, and that the interest in every phase of the work of the church was well sustained through the meeting.

Under Mr. Holmes' leadership, the church has become a close-knit, eager band of Christians, willing to carry on with small numbers the activities usually associated with a large church. It has been the subject of commendation that evening church worship is sustained and the "powerhouse of the church"—the prayer meeting—on Wednesday evenings, is a source of great spiritual strength.

The meeting closed with a period of devotion led by the pastor in which others participated. It was an occasion of real fellowship, marking a milestone in the long history of the Acton-Baptist church.

Before the meeting closed, the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted:
