**Only Boy Contestant**  
Don Harris, lone boy contestant, stated his desire to use money for other purposes than that of building reform schools and penal institutions. He stressed the importance of erecting areas and community centres to interest the young people of today as a means to eliminating crime.

The young speaker emphasized his distaste for reform schools. He stated they only breed crime and concluded by saying "Three square meals a day served in institutions, encourage loafers and beatniks."

Peter Dunham, chairman of the panel of judges, congratulated the young speakers on their talks and informed them it was a hard choice for the judges to choose one winner from among the seven contestants.

He pointed out that the standards were unusually high and only a small margin separated each speaker from top position. He criticized the speakers on their tendency to recite their speeches rather than learn them thoroughly.
