Most Successful Sector Plan Parish Hall Dedication Highlights

Annual reports and the naming of church officers highlighted the vestry meeting of St. Alban's church attended by over 40 in the parish hall Monday.

The Rev. H. B. Stokroff, rector, the Rev. J. B. Stokroff, people's warden Sam Snow reported an increase in attendance over 1958. There are 852 church members with 175 in the Sunday school.

Highlight of the year, Mr. Snow felt, was the dedication of the parish hall which was "in deed something to be proud of."

"It is sincerely hoped that with the aid of the sector plan held in the latter part of 1959, the finances of the church will be improved considerably," he said.

Harold Denny, rector's warden, gave the church wardens' parochial estimate, resolving from the sector plan which he described as most successful. "The program for 1960 is a substantial one," he said.
