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Set Inquest Date For Bus Accident

February 15 has been set for the date of the inquest into the school bus and train accident which occurred at a C.P.R. rail way crossing at Hillsburgh last Thursday afternoon, January 28.

This action was announced this week following a visit to Guelph by Deputy Attorney General E. Silk and Ontario Provincial Police Commissioner W. A. Clark. The inquest will be held in Hillsburgh. Three crash victims, students of the Elm District High School, died within the flaming bus after it was struck by a slow moving C.P.R. train.

The driver of the bus, Calvin Leitch, was taken to Guelph Hospital where he died the following day. He was reported to have suffered 80 per cent. burns to his body in the accident.



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
