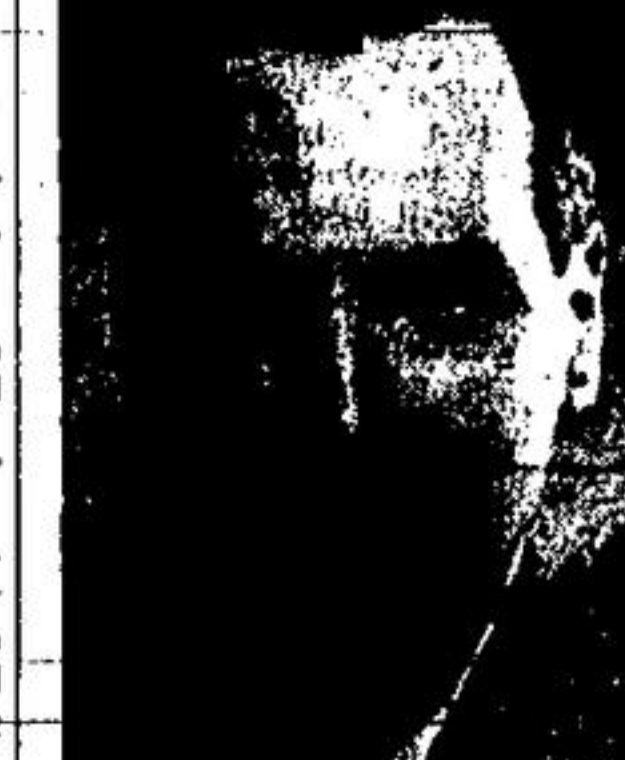
Dorothy Mullin, secretary of the Southern Ontario Association was named secretary of the Southern Ontario executive by the election of officers held during the Saturday meeting.

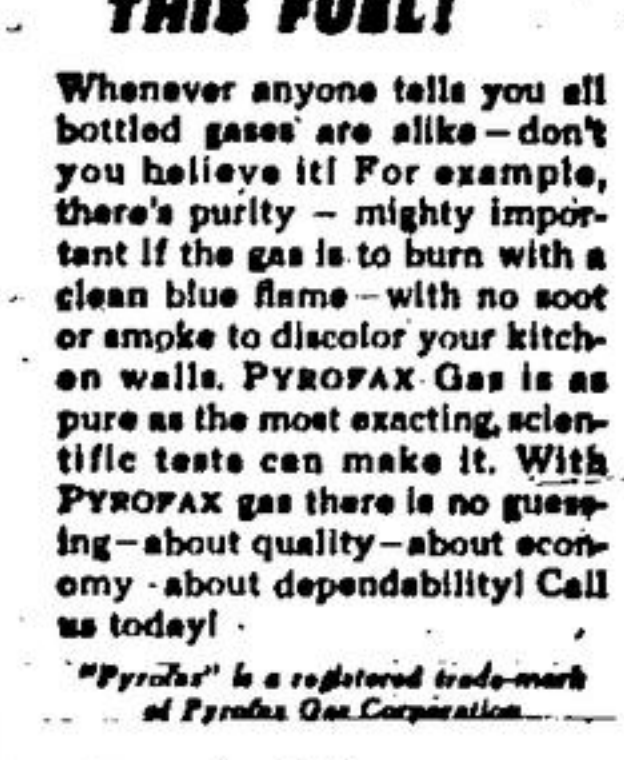
