

School Safety Hazards Prompt Brief to Council

Members of the Home and School Association executive agreed to send a letter to council concerning safety measures at the school during their meeting Monday, February 1, at the Robert Little school. They discussed traffic problems and made suggestions.

(The letter follows at the conclusion of this article.)

The group talked over the forthcoming meeting being held in the Robert Little school auditorium February 18. Following a film the meeting will be taken over by four senior high school students, two high school teachers and two parents.

Reports were given on the fun fair being held in March and the county music festival being held here in April.

The association has agreed to sponsor the showing of the film Henry V at the Roxy theatre in April, and possibly more films of this nature may be sponsored. The showing is primarily for high school students.

The letter sent to council follows:

February 3rd, 1960.

The Mayor,
Town of Acton, Ontario.
Dear Sir:-

The membership of the above-mentioned Association wish to draw to your attention the dangerous traffic conditions which currently prevail on the main approaches to the M. Z. Bennett and Acton High Schools.

It is their considered view that loss of life may occur unless immediate steps are taken to remedy the deficiencies of what should be regarded as the minimum measures necessary to ensure a degree of safety for the students attending the said Schools.

State Recommendations

Initially, it is their recommendation that as a preventive step:

(a) Sidewalks be provided for at least one side (east) of Acton Boulevard and for the requisite distances on Peel, Arthur, and Mill Streets.

(b) A regular road sanding program for these areas be effected forthwith.

(c) A speed limit of 10 miles per hour be enforced on the aforementioned streets.

(d) All intersections on Acton Boulevard be made "Stop" streets.

(e) Pedestrian "guide lanes" be placed on Acton Boulevard at Mill Street.

(f) Contact be made with the owner of the property which runs between Macdonald and Mason Boulevard and Division Street area to the M. Z. Bennett and High Schools, with a view to installing a pathway direct from the M. Z. Bennett and High Schools to the residential areas on the aforesaid mentioned streets.

(g) In view of the increased traffic on the No. 25 Highway, a sidewalk is urgently required on Main Street South for the area from Ransom Street to Vimy Street.

Earnest Request

It is earnestly requested that you give these recommendations your immediate support in order to substantiate our belief that no one child should lose its life because of inadequate action at the appropriate time.

Deviating slightly from the above, it was further requested that the "No Parking" restrictions on Acton Boulevard and Mill Street be amended in order to accommodate the many participants of Night School Classes at the Acton High School.
