

Pete McMullen Named President Of Halton Baseball Association

Halton County Baseball Association got off to one of its finest starts in the past 30 years Saturday, when close to 40 persons attended the annual meeting in Acton.

Pete McMullen was returned to the chair as president of the Association for his 14th consecutive year and promised that he was going to be tougher than ever before.

Mr. McMullen stated earlier that he would not carry on with the job after his only nominated opponent James Black of Oakville withdrew his name from the position because of lack of sufficient time to devote to the job. However, after being coaxed the jolly head man who has done much for baseball in this district over the past 15 years or so agreed to carry on for at least another year.

In his windup speech from the chair for the 1960 season (which he commented, was almost identical to the season of 1947 when three championships came to the county) the president noted that no less than 11 championships have come into the county since that year. Ironical part of it all is the fact that Campbellville gathered eight of the 11 with two going to Milton and one to Waterdown.

and vice president. This is the first time in all of the 30 years the negro gentleman, who is well respected for his offerings to the baseball world, has climbed above being a member of the four man executive.

Executive members who were named were Archie Cairns of Milton (another veteran in baseball who put his start in the championship village, Campbellville, and has since moved to the county town where he travels to almost every ball game within travelling distance), Earl Nicholson of Waterdown and Jim Waldie, Milton.

Name Bill Greer

Named to succeed the executive was Wm. H. "Bill" Greer of Burlington who was named by the officers in a meeting following the annual affair. Also named to office was Bruce Hood as secretary-treasurer for the coming term.

Two more veterans from the executive this year including Earl Nicholson from Waterdown, who has caused some hair raising moments since his inception into the league by dreaming up all sorts of things to query the executive and at times giving cause for special meetings to be called. Jim Waldie who has been secretary-treasurer of the county loop for 12 years moved from his post to take over a seat on the executive and will be along in an advisory capacity for decisions arising out of league operations.

Randell Partially Retires

Bill Randell of Milton who has been connected with the baseball world on and off for as long as most people can remember, stepped down from his seat as vice

president and decided it was time to have some new blood in there to do the job. Mr. Randell was president of the Association for six years in about 1935 era and still remains a member of the group as a past president.

Doug Wilson, who was appointed Oakville Vice-Chief since last being installed as member of the Halton Baseball executive, also stepped down after deciding that he could not possibly devote the time required to help in the work of the eight man board. Both men thanked the group for their support in many matters over the past few years and promised to assist if they were needed at any time.

Amendments Dropped

In the other end of the agenda all eight Intermediate clubs were represented as well as many of the minor teams which operated in a much more flourishing minor set up than ever before. The minors included an estimated 300 more players last year than in 1959.

Each team was allowed one vote from the Intermediate loop and on most matters a hassle developed one way or another until it was decided that certain changes should be made.

Rules Declared

- Dropped the group playoff tax which Campbellville was the only club to pay.
- Ordered all raised out games to be played within ten days after the cancellation.
- Declared outcome of all games and any irregularities by umpires to be reported to league executive.
- Said player certificates have to be in 10 days before the league

Playoffs Brampton "As" Edge Acton By One Goal Margin Tuesday

A one goal margin is all the Brampton "A" club could come up with Tuesday night, when they edged the local midget "B" club 4-3 in the first game of the finals for the tri-county "A" title.

Unforeseen by the team managers the series with Brampton was a last minute decision by the league president prior to Acton meeting Hespeler in the next round of Midget "B" finals.

Denis Gibbons started for the local club - he sparked them with his tricky playmaking and scored the three Acton goals. Leatherland guarding the twine for the locals stopped shot after shot but allowed some easy markers to drift by.

Play was steady from the drop of the puck and in the first period the Brampton club had more up position than they knew what to do with as the Acton players stormed into the Brampton zone, time after time.

Lucky Goalie

Although Brampton opened the scoring up at 1:59 when St. McDonald flicked the red light and again at 10:05 when Livingston scored, Acton carried the bulk of the play and only luck on the part of the Brampton goalie prevented several tallies by the local lads.

Acton's first score came at 12:55 in the first period when Denis Gibbons whopped home the age old goal on a combination play from Jefferys and McCristall.

The first 15 minute period was packed with excitement and last playmaking as players on both teams were determined to go after a big lead. The two game series goals to count brings the title to the team with the largest margin of goals.

Brampton played with three men short in the first period when Bartlett, Porter and McCaulley received trips to the penalty box for tripping and spearing while Acton had Ron Mellon sit out two minutes in the cooler for using the elbow.

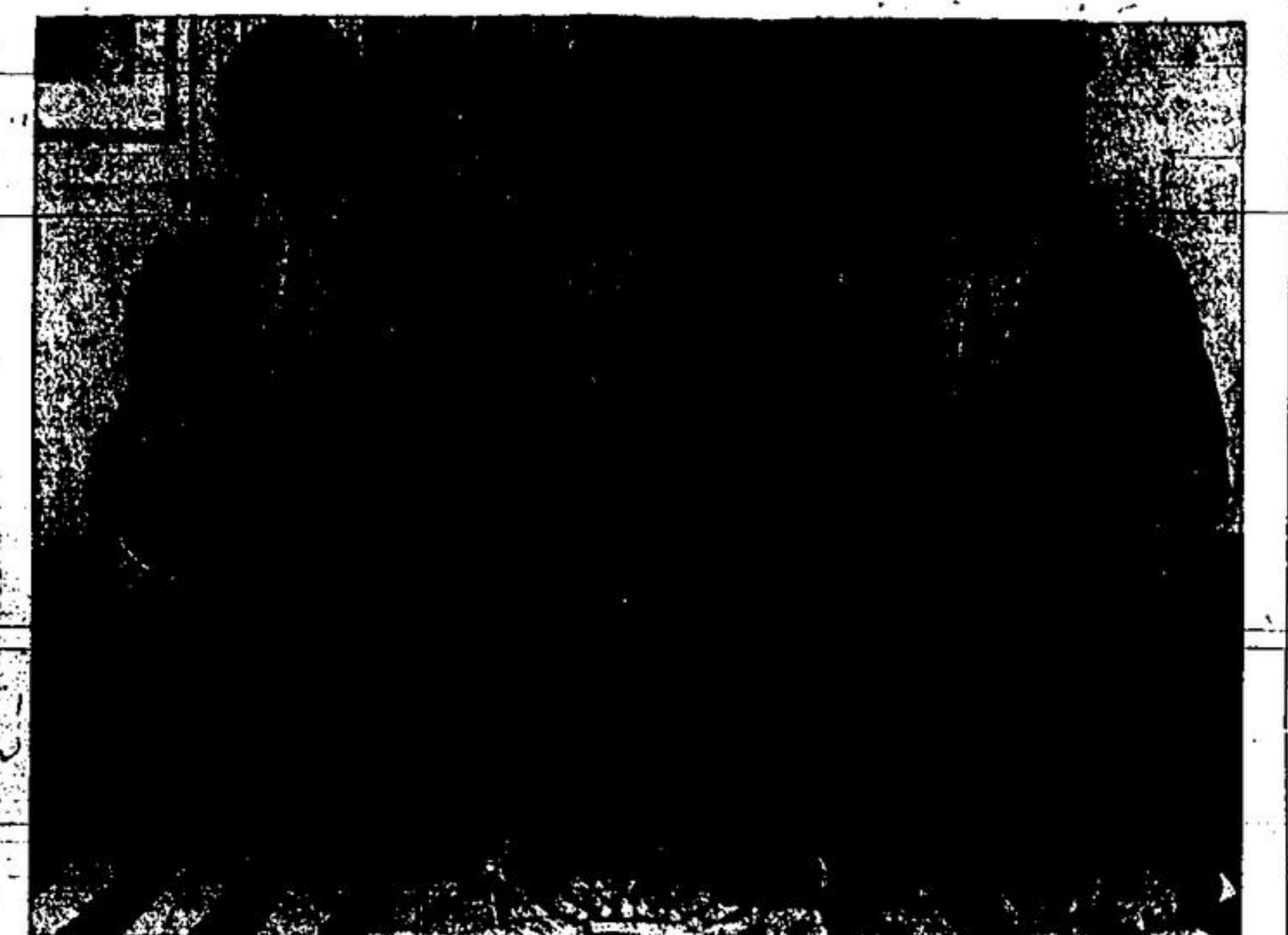
