Magic Feats, Hobby Display Thrill 20 Young Guests During Rotary Meet

An exhibition of magic and an illustrated talk on hobbies highlighted the Acton Rotary Club meeting Tuesday evening when W. Fleming Sr. of Toronto gave a demonstration of "black magic" to 20 children present as guests of the Rotarians for the evening.

Feats of magic were performed by the 74-year-old entertainer and his sleight of hand with card tricks kept the youngsters on the edge of their seats as they attempted to determine how articles were made to disappear and reappear.

Introduced by rotarian Rev. A. H. McKenzie, the guest speaker told his interested audience that a hobby was a means of relaxation and urged everyone to acquire one.

He emphasized that every man has approximately 2,000 leisure hours every year and if a portion of this time was spent with a hobby, a greater interest in life would result.

His own hobbies ranged from stamp collecting, painting, photography, fingerprinting, handwriting analysis and magic tricks to pyrology and many other interesting pastimes.

The speaker noted it was not always possible to choose your profession but you could always choose your own hobby.

He pointed out to each youngster that a library was an important asset in every home and mentioned the first book to be acquired in a home library should be a Bible and the second, a dictionary.

After explaining to the club members and children he had been forced to leave school when only a youngster, Mr. Fleming stressed how he had taught himself unassisted the art of oil painting and several other hobbies.

He produced several photographs of paintings he had completed and noted one of his paintings was hanging in the White House in Washington.

Reviewing the history of the painting, Mr. Fleming told how after returning from a western trip with a colored picture of Mount Eisenhower, he had done an oil painting from the snap.

Other feats performed by the jovial entertainer were demonstrations of handwriting analysis and pyrology, when members of the club volunteered their services.
