

## Fate of Arena's Future Discussed Parks Board Learns Support Lacking

An hour's heated discussion on the fate of the Acton Arena, failed to conclude whether it was more feasible for an arena commission or Board of Parks Management to operate the arena, during the Tuesday night Board of Parks Management meeting.

Following the request from board chairman, R. R. Parker, for a report of the meeting held by a committee consisting of local organization representatives to decide possible formation of an arena commission, viewpoints were aired. It was learned the general attitude was not to support the Parks Board in a fund raising program for artificial ice.

A Johnson, board member, informed his colleagues, during the discussions with the representatives of various organizations, it was learned they would offer full support to a proposed arena commission in a fund raising program, but would not back the parks board in this type of venture.

Asked why this attitude was taken, Mr. Johnson told the board it was divulged at the meeting that funds raised during the swimming pool campaign had been diverted from the original purpose.

### Explains Situation

Mr. Parker explained the program undertaken ten years ago, when an attempt to raise funds was made for a three-way program, consisting of a wading pool, swimming pool and change room for the park.

The chairman pointed out, only a portion of the money was raised for the complete project. It was put in a trust fund, under the supervision of a swimming pool committee.

He explained the first step of the program was carried out when the wading pool was constructed. Recently, when the Parks Board decided to build change stations in the park, the balance of the trust fund was turned over to the board, to assist with this project. He noted the change stations were also a part of the three-way program originally undertaken.

Mr. Parker informed the board the swimming pool money had in no way been diverted as the trustees for the fund had agreed the funds were being used for another portion of the project.

### Heard Beef Many Times

Mr. Johnson reminded the chairman he was only relaying the general feeling of the people at the meeting. He noted that since his arrival in town he had heard this beef being aired several times by many people.

G. Barbeau, council's representative on the board, informed the members that perhaps they were overlooking the fact that the Parks Board was also a Community Centres Board.

Mayor John Goy told the members that council could appoint additional Community Centres Boards.

It was pointed out that perhaps the park and arena projects could be placed under the direction of the new boards.

**Teachers' Salary Schedule**

The schedule covers five classifications as awarded by O.S.S.T.F. based on teacher qualifications:

Class 0 for uncertified teachers provides a minimum of \$4,300.

Class 1, \$4,500, to \$7,800.

Class 2, \$4,700, to \$8,000; Class 3, \$5,000, to \$8,300; Class 4, \$5,400

to \$8,700; principal, \$5,900, to \$9,300, plus a school size allowance of \$10 per teaching staff member; assistant principal, classification plus \$100; vice-principal, classification plus \$500.

The teacher annual increment rate of increase from minimum to maximum is \$300, principal and vice principal, \$300.

The experience allowance is \$300 per year for the first two years and \$200 per year for the next five years to a maximum of \$1,600.

Cumulative sick leave is one-half the unused statutory 20-day sick leave.

tion of two boards with the Parks Board looking after their interests and an arena board to govern the arena.

Mr. Parker stated he thought there might be some conflict if this took place citing as an instance parking which might become a problem for the visitors to the arena. The Parks Board could refuse, according to them, to allow parking in the arena area.

According to the by-law, parking facilities are provided at the west end of the park and presently users of the arena vehicles in front and the side of the arena area.

Mr. Parker explained that if the arena was renovated it would be a year-round operation and the parking problem could be a contentious point.

Mrs. Johnson pointed out there could be no conflict as the two boards would have to work together.

### Council's Position

Mr. Parker asked Councillor Barbeau and Mayor Goy what position council would take in the event there were two separate boards and trouble began. Mr. Barbeau answered, on his own behalf, informing the chairman it would seem feasible to review the Parks Board by-law first and see what control they had in the park. He noted it was his opinion council would uphold the board in their authority of control.

Mr. Parker suggested that perhaps the Parks Board could assume the arena and have a separate committee as formed to raise funds for artificial ice and renovations.

Mrs. Johnson reminded him there had been no ill feeling towards the Parks Board in taking over the management of the arena but it had been stressed that the organizations would not support the board in raising funds.

He also asked if it was possible for the board to plan money raising programs and learned it was not.

During the discussion Mayor Goy suggested perhaps a number of the residents were not aware of the procedure regarding the board taking over the monies from the trust fund, to be used for the change station. He noted they had not taken the trouble to have this clarified.

Mr. Barbeau noted the board could only make expenditures for projects for which grants had been received.

In conclusion the mayor informed the board he would attempt to arrange a meeting with council representatives and the board to discuss the arena situation further.

### Request Use of Park

Vic Masters, president of Acton Legion Minor Sports, was present to request permission to use the park August 1 for the Civic Holiday program.

The board will consider this request.

Dave Manes requested permission to provide pony rides at the

park during the summer months. The board will discuss this and will advise Mr. Manes.

A resolution was presented to call for tenders for the booth concession in the park and pony rides during the summer season.

It was also agreed to contact H. Fivett to see if he was available to assume the duties of park attendant again this year. The chairman was empowered to employ him for the season.

Board member L. Kilby enquired if the board intended to repair the baseball screen at the park or tear it down. After a discussion Mr. Barbeau pointed out that the board had a certain obligation to the public to provide them with some protection.

Further investigation will be given to this at a later date.

A Johnson was appointed board representative to attend future meetings of the proposed arena commission.

It was learned that Jim Buckland, swimming instructor for the Water Y's Swimming Club, was attempting to provide the board with a list of names of prospective life guards.

### Stump Pulling Bee

Before the meeting concluded a discussion took place on stump removal at Fairy Lake and it was proposed to hold a bee and invite interested citizens to take part.

Volunteers with tools will be required as well as anyone with heavy equipment such as bulldozers and winch trucks.

The members felt that if they organized a full day program and provided dinner on the spot, it would be an excellent method of creating interest.
