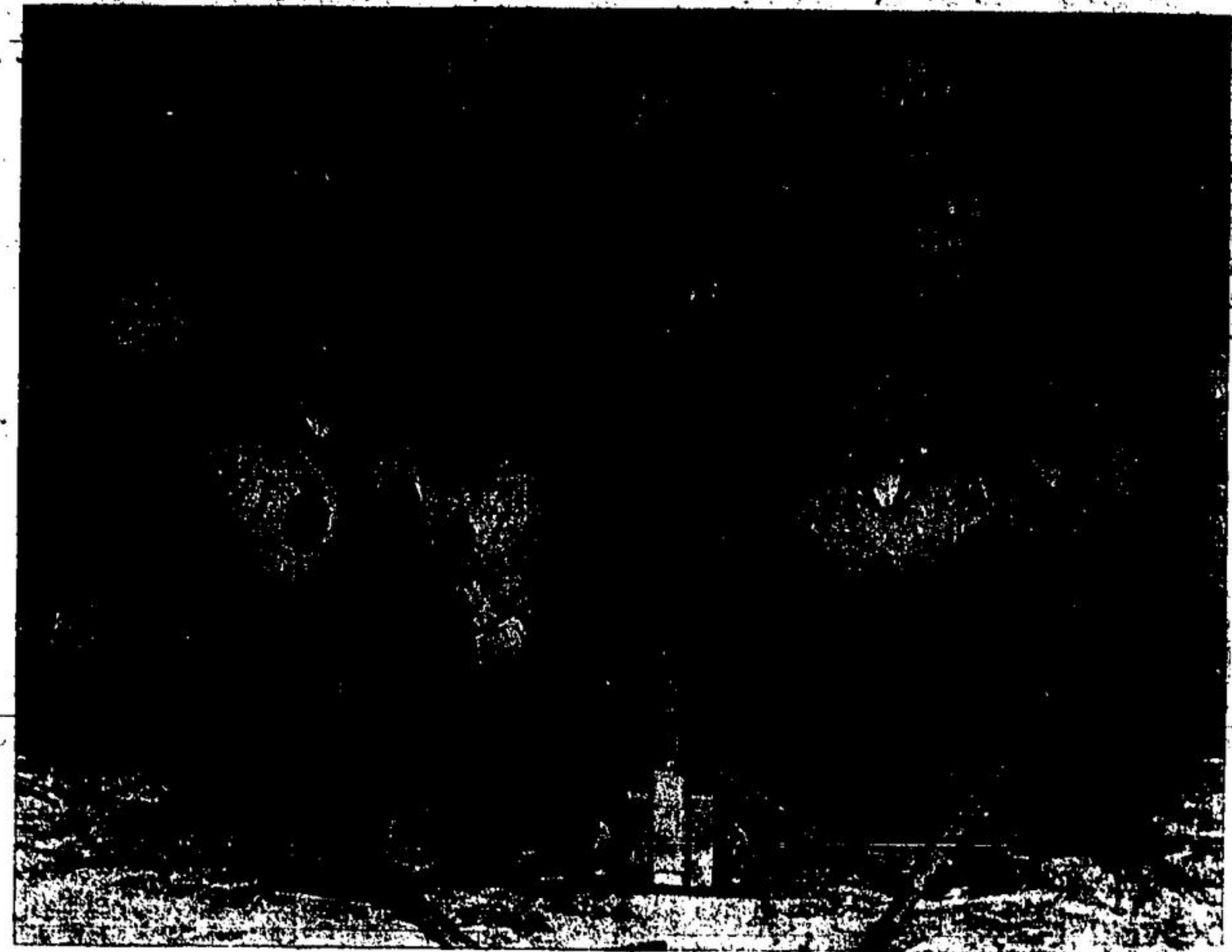

Junior Firemen To Aid Adults

Two fire departments may soon become a reality in town, but there will be a slight difference between the two. The newest one will be children of all ages who will be asked to form a Junior Fire Department to get them interested in fire prevention.

The idea for the junior group originated in Hamilton and is partly sponsored by a Hamilton TV station. Crown Threatens to Prosecute County for Court House Door

A threat from Halton Crown Attorney P. K. McWilliams that Halton County Council could be charged under the Egress from Public Buildings Act, only drew the wrath of county councillors when the correspondence was read at Tuesday afternoon's meeting of council. The Crown Attorney said the front door of the Milton Court House opened into the building and was a "flagrant breach of the law."

The committee on county buildings reported studying the letter, and including the drinking fountain, office directory and toilet facilities in this year's estimates, but could not find justification for any other corrections. "His criticism in connection with the fire hazard is not justified and his threat of action against the County wholly unwarranted," the committee reported.

Oakville Reeve Fred Tilley, a member of the committee, told council the implications and the tone of the letter had upset the committee. "There is a far better way to get things done."

"Let him charge us and see what happens," he concluded. Council agreed to have the letter returned to Mr. McWilliams.

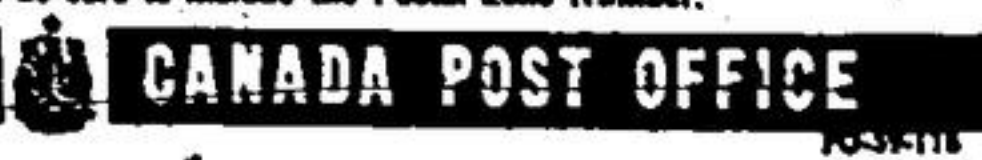

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Queries Town Snow Removal Cites Problems in Lakeview

Dear Editor:
Can anybody in the town inform me as to why there is so much trouble in clearing away the snow at the bottom of Lakeview Subdivision?

Every time the snow blocks the corner of Jeffrey, and Elizabeth Drives, a phone call has to be made to the town office, who always seem to be under the impression that you are trying to pull their leg, or something to that effect.

Speaking for myself, I have to be at work at 5 a.m. in the morning, and on several occasions I have been held up for several hours due to the fact that the road had plugged up during the night, and had not been ploughed out.

On one occasion the police cruiser, on night duty was stuck up to his axles in the course of bringing a Dept. of Highways snow plough down to clear the road.

Elizabeth Drive is the main road out of the subdivision, and is such it should be kept clear at all times, regardless as to whether it is 2 p.m. in the afternoon or 3 a.m. in the morning.

On many a windy day the plough hasn't cleared the snow away in 24 hours. In a town of this size, a regular snow clearing time table should be set up, not between the hours of 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. as one official claims.

It is hoped that when next winter comes along, a proper snow fence is erected on Elizabeth Drive by the town officials who have been fortunate enough to have been elected at that time next year.

This is a matter which should get attention from the right departments, as I am sure that there would be quite an uproar if a doctor or an ambulance could not make an urgent call some windy evening. This is apart from anybody trying to get to his work in the early morning.
