### High School Students Join Junior Rangers

Hundreds of applications are pouring in to the Department of Lands and Forests in Toronto as Ontario high school students seek to fill vacancies in the Junior Ranger programme inaugurated by the Department during the World War Two days.

One of the most successful of all Department experiments has been the programme whereby students are sent to the north for the holiday months. There they work under the supervision of skilled rangers and learn more in two months than most of their parents learn in a lifetime of vacationing.

Requirements are fairly stiff: Applicants must be 17 years of age by July 1, 1960, must be in Grade 11 or higher and of good health and physique. Applications far outnumber the actual vacancies, in some years as many as 5,000 students have applied for approximately 500 jobs.

Application forms are obtained from the Personnel Section, Department of Lands and Forests, Queen's Park, Toronto. Employment is for the months of July and August and accepted applicants are required to undertake to remain for the full period. Present pay is \$4 per day plus board and lodging, and accommodation may be in tents or cabins.

The Junior Ranger programme has been a success from its inauguration.

Men of the church worked last weekend, having time in the bed rooms and the job continues this weekend.

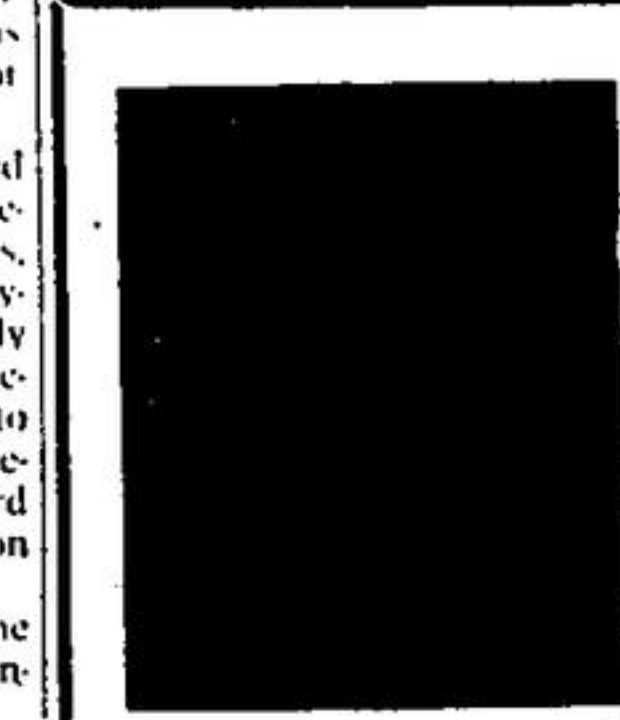
Mr. Engel begins his pastorate here July 1.
