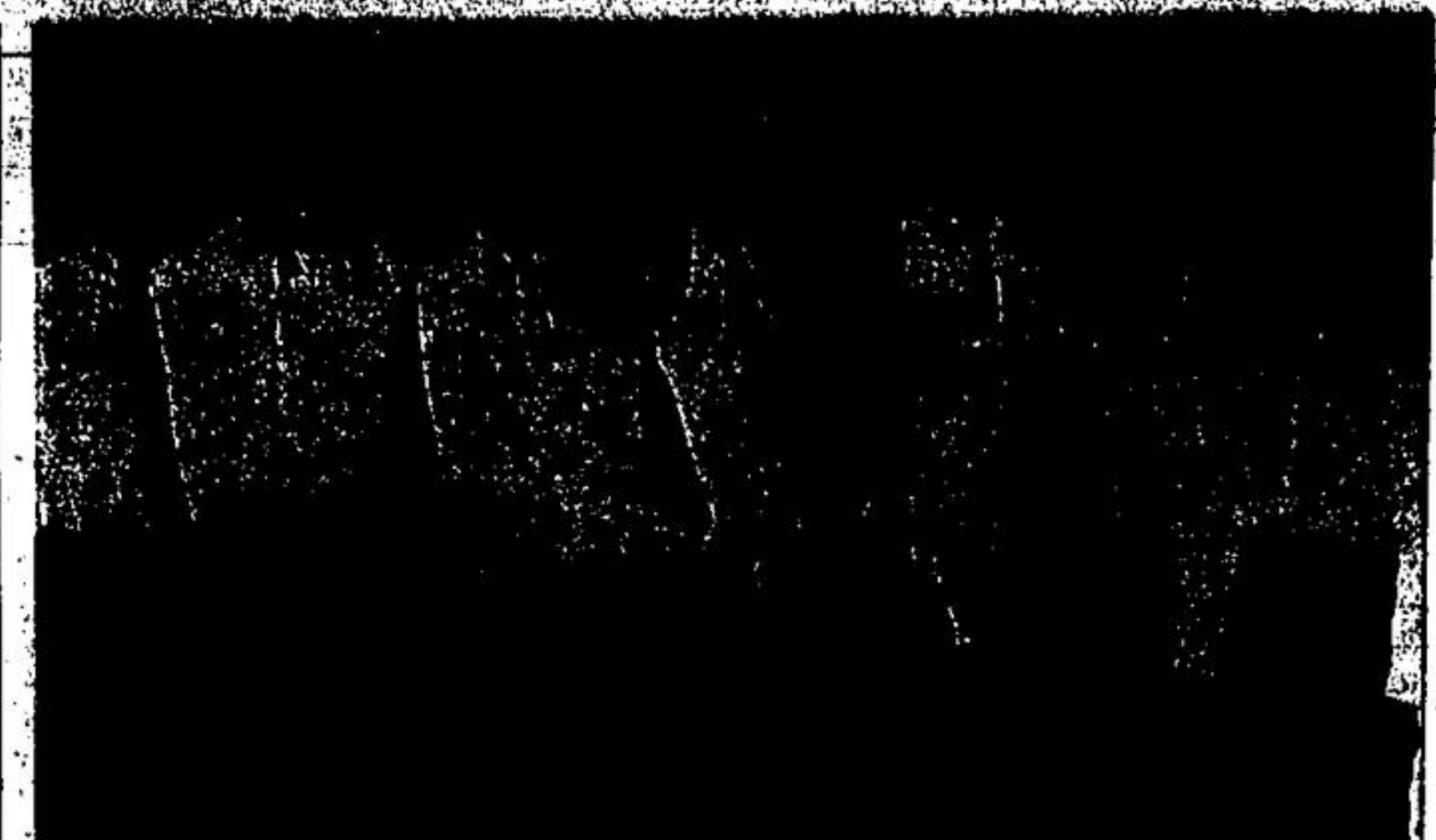
Person in Town Puzzle Subject

Pass Accounts, Accept Tenders At Erin Township Council Meeting

The acceptance of tenders, payment of accounts and reading of correspondence were dealt with by Erin township council during their fourth session of the year Monday, April 4, at Hillsburgh.

After reviewing three tenders from Cox Construction, Holman Construction and Blyth Construction companies for supplying gravel, council accepted the tender of Cox Construction Co. at 93 cents per cubic yard.

The tender for printing was awarded to the Erin Advocate, amounting to \$975, plus sales tax.

Daylight Saving Council agreed to go on Daylight Saving Time in order to correspond with surrounding communities.

The road superintendent was instructed to have all patrolmen gather snow fence and store in their respective divisions. They are to report to council the number of rolls of fence in their possession. It was agreed to have a telephone installed in the municipal office as soon as possible and a deposit of \$10 was authorized paid to J. Gray for the installation.

ent hospital accounts, \$100.47; general accounts, \$962.42; road accounts, \$9,501.14; welfare accounts, \$360.70.
