Review Substation Purchase Commission to Study Budget

Further study will be given the capital budget by the Acton Hydro Commission before final decision is made to purchase No. 2 Substation from the H.E.P.C. at a cost of \$38,021.

The decision was made during the meeting Thursday, April 14, Superintendent D. Mason was instructed to prepare an itemized budget for further review.

Purchase of No. 1 Substation was made by the former Public Utilities Commission in 1959 in order to purchase electric power at a cheaper rate.

The commission agreed surplus funds could be utilized for purchase of No. 2 Substation.

To Review Budget

Commissioner G. Beatty suggested to the commission this review should be made in an attempt to eliminate any non-essentials from the proposed budget and to give the commissioners a clear picture of projects for the future.

Approval had been given by the Ontario Hydro for a capital budget expenditure of \$24,000 for the year. Chairman E. G. Tyler Sr. informed the commission it was only a tentative estimate and a small portion of this amount would possibly be used.

Mr. Beatty agreed with the chairman that stressed the importance of having a clear picture of expected expenditures.

Commissioner G. McCutcheon suggested the superintendent prepare a list of projects for the next year or two in order to have them placed in their proper priority rating.

To Bill Town

Secretary-treasurer Mrs. A. Urquhart asked the commission how to bill the town for their share of the meter reading. She is to submit an itemized statement in order to give council an indication of costs.

Chairman E. G. Tyler told members the high school had been supplied with an electric

clothes dryer by the H.E.P.C. at no cost to the commission.

The property committee was instructed to obtain prices on an awning for the Elgin Street office. It was pointed out that the agreement with the owner of the building called for the commission to share a portion of the cost of an awning.

Will Prosecute

Superintendent Mason reported several light bulbs and globes had been smashed by children using B.B. guns. After a lengthy discussion on the subject, the commission decided to prosecute anyone guilty of damaging hydro property and noted the local police had issued a warning against the discharging of B.B. guns in town.

A reward was suggested for anyone providing information against an offender and a follow-up by prosecution of the guilty parties.

Reeve J. M. Greer informed the commission that council was engaging an appraiser to review insurance on all municipal buildings. He asked if the hydro commission desired to have their buildings inspected.

The commission agreed the plan was a good one since the appraiser would be independent from any insurance company.

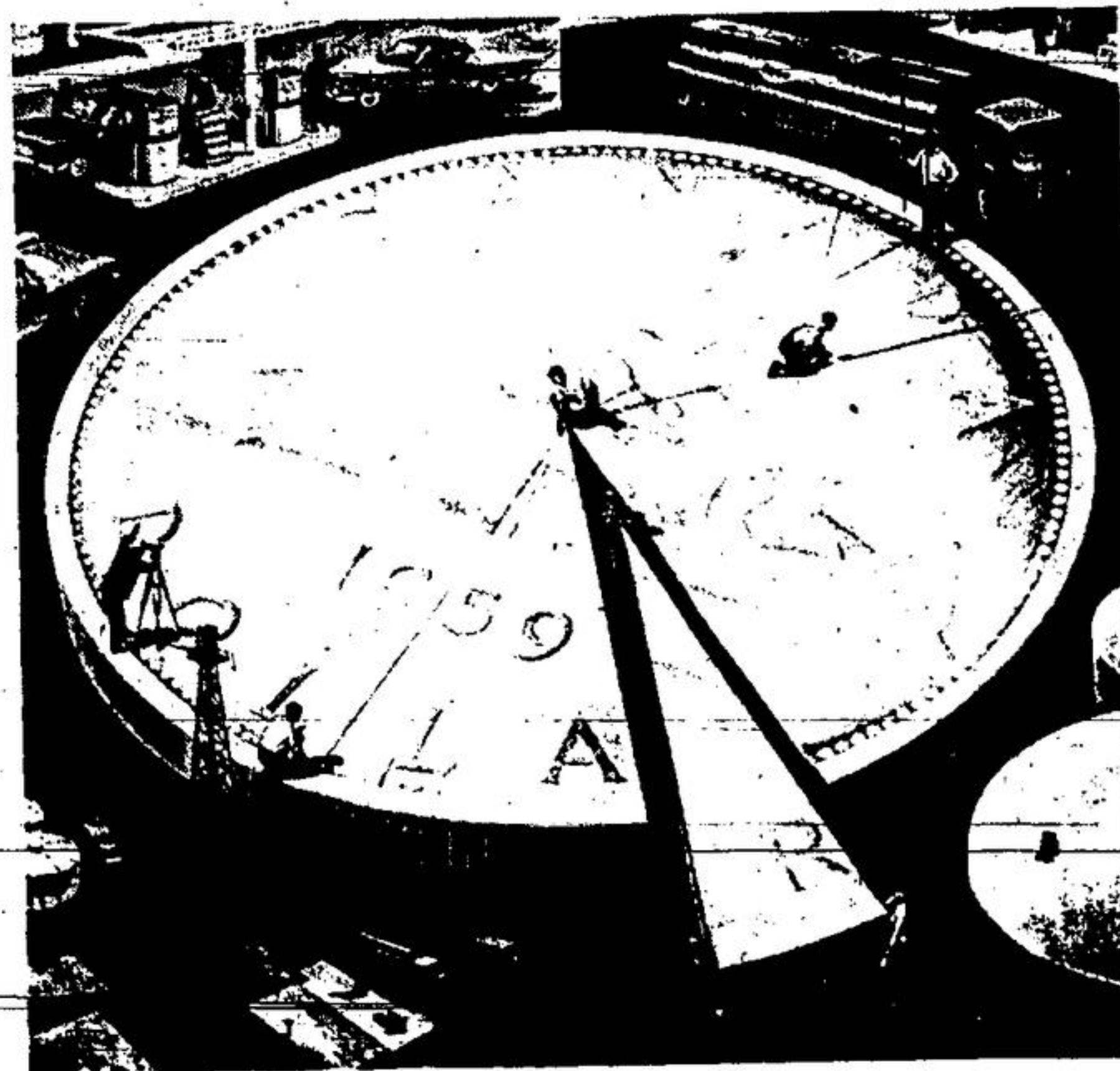
WHEREAS this community can benefit from friendly relationships among business competitors, between our town and the surrounding area and other communities across Canada, between employer and employee.
